In Their Words: David Orbock

What was your very first camera? A Kodak Brownie Hawkeye

What do you consider essential gear to take on a shoot, particularly if you need to travel light? Essential camera gear would depend on the purpose of the shoot, e.g., a bird photographer's needs would be far different than a portrait session, or in my case an outing to capture panoramic images. In general terms essential gear would consist of a camera, flash (maybe), appropriate lenses, light meter, rain gear (maybe), film, tripod, spare camera battery, flashlight and a creative/exploring attitude.

What person, place, or thing inspired you to become a photographer? I bought my first camera to document places and people after I was drafted into the army. I used it for 1 1/2 years until I bought a 35mm Petri camera.

Which 3 people, living or dead, would you like to have for dinner and conversation? Albert Einstein for his insight on the universe and humanity. Alexander Orbock my grand-

father who died while I was still young. To clear up many unanswered questions concerning my heritage. <u>John Steinbeck</u> to enlighten me on the intimate details surrounding his novels and travels.

What is one piece of advice you would like to offer to others on following their bliss in photography? Keep your day job until you can make ends meet in your photographic endeavors.

West Virginia Club Trip Blog Introduction by Richard Eskin

Editor's Note: The following are excerpts from the personal blog provided by Richard Eskin (http://richeskinphoto.com/blog/?m=201310), which I'm using as an introduction to the West Virginia Club Trip photo montage. Please use this collection of words and photos to become inspired to attend the next club trip. You'll be glad that you went.

Camera Club Trip to WV (posted on October 14, 2013):

The Baltimore Camera Club recently arranged a member trip to West Virginia. In the past they have gone more to the north, closer to Canaan Valley, Dolly Sods, and Seneca Rocks. Happily, this time they went to Pocahontas County, which is my favorite area of WV.

Lodging was arranged at the Inn at Mountain Quest in Frost, WV, about 18 miles from Marlinton, which is the main town in the area. The rooms were a surprise. I was expecting rather old style rooms or rooms you might find at a B&B. The rooms were very nice, very comfortable, and rather delightfully eclectic in design, reflecting a space theme, an African savannah, and an extremely modern black and white design (my room), among others I didn't see.

Raj agreed to share the ride with me, and we stuck together for the whole trip. We went directly to Beartown State Park, which was the furthest from the Inn of the places I wanted to see, so that on the following days, travel would be at least a little shorter. Beartown was all about rocks and ferns from a boardwalk.

The next morning, after a really fine breakfast, and some spiderweb and foggy tree photos, we headed for the Falls at Hills Creek. Before we even hit the falls, a pond right across the road had some good fall reflections. At the Falls, the lower falls has the largest drop at 63 feet, with a very good viewing platform.

After the Falls we hit the Cranberry Glades Boardwalk, which I think is better in the spring. I did shoot some dried ferns and a cecropia moth caterpillar, but nothing really exciting. To end the day, we drove up the Highland Scenic Highway. In some areas, the colors were doing fairly well, but I just couldn't find a particular tree or color mass that excited me.

On Sunday morning we stopped at a place Raj had seen on Saturday, with a pond reflecting an old weathered barn. The mist cooperated, and we stayed there a while, before moving on to Watoga State Park. Some nice fall reflections in the lake, but nothing much else, so we started home.

Rooms and food at the Inn were excellent, but the Inn was almost 20 miles east of Marlinton, and most of the areas I preferred were west of Marlinton, so there was a lot of traveling for Raj and me. Others went to the Cass Railroad, the radio telescope at Green Bank, and the windmill farm, all to the north. Bottom line: Good Trip!

Tips For Photographing Pets and Young Children By Lewis Karchin

I have 3 miniature poodle girls (Zellie, Peggie, Roxie). One of them is getting up in years and starting to have failing health. My wife Rachel loves her, as she never had a pet in her life until Roxie. One of our friends who has a 2 year old boy asked me if I could take some shots of him, so I thought that it was an opportunity to try and combine shots of him with the girls. Well, that was a lot more difficult than I bargained for. One hyper little boy and 3 hyper little girls equal a very hard photo shoot.

Taking photographs of children and pets requires a lot of patience. If you are patient enough, they will end up getting exhausted and you will have the opportunity to get a decent shot.

Go Macro and Zoom and Forget the Tripod

Putting on that long lens and filling the frame with close-up shots often make beautiful animal and young child portraits. I mostly use an 85 mm lens. I also use a 55-300 zoom.

Use Natural Light

If possible, always use natural light when taking your picture. Avoid flash, as flash burst can, not only cause red-eye, but also frighten the animal and child. Instead, try to go outside or, if it is not possible, in a room well lit by a large window. You will be using a fast shutter speed.

Keep The Eyes Sharp

Having sharp eyes is important in any kind of portraits photography. As they say, "Eyes are the Window to the Soul" and pets' eyes can be very expressive. So make sure to focus on your pet's eyes and keep them tack sharp.

Lay On The ground

It's most important to get down to their level. It shows us the way they see world! Sit on the floor or lie on your belly, and remember to shoot from their eye level or below. Also, try unusual angles.

Tips For Photographing Pets and Young Children (continued...) By Lewis Karchin

Manual Focus vs. Dynamic-area AF and Motor Drive

One of the most difficult things is to get your child or pet to stay still. An easy trick is to let them play quietly and, once you have everything ready, let someone call for him or whistle. This will surprise him, catch his attention, and you will have a few seconds to capture him in a nice and alert posture. If you want to use autofocus, you need a DSLR that allows dynamic focus points. After you achieve focus on the subject with your selected focus point, the camera engages multiple points and maintains tracking of the subject by automatically employing a new focus point according to the subject's movement and changes of composition (while the shutter-release button is pressed halfway). This gives you more compositional freedom when shooting subjects moving erratically from side to side or top to bottom within the frame. Also, it helps to shoot as many frames per second as your DSLR will allow.

Collector's Corner Korona 8x10 Camera By Gordon Risk

My latest acquisition is an 8"x10" wooden view camera called a Korona Home Portrait, made by *Gundlach* in Rochester NY (Image #1). Manufactured between 1915-1930, it is walnut stained cherry wood with nickeled hardware and black leatherette bellows (Image #2). It weighs approximately 11½ pounds. The rear focus uses rack and pinion gears with two tracks on the base rails. The back swings to correct converging lines. The back can be set vertical or horizontal, called a reversing back (Image #3).

The camera's name plate (Image #4) lists the maker as "Gundlach-Manhattan Optical Co., Rochester, NY," referring to Ernst Gundlach. I have heard of him before, but did not know his history. He was born in Germany in 1834 and was already an accomplished maker of microscopes and optic lenses when he immigrated to the US in 1872. By 1876, he was working for Bausch & Lomb Incorporated, but after two years, left to open his own business in Rochester, called the Gundlach Optical Company. He continued to make Gundlach microscopes in the 20th century. Many company changes took place in those later years and Gundlach decided to return to Germany in 1904, where he died in 1908. The company carried on with his name, acquiring camera and shutter businesses until 1928 when John Seebold bought the company and continued with cameras and optics until 1972.


