

He gave a list of what he refers to as a Craftsmanship Checklist, giving attractors and detractors to the appreciation of a photograph. For more information about Roy, and to learn more about his fine art photography and instruction, please visit his website at <u>http://www.roysewallphotography.com/iWeb/</u> <u>Home.html</u> The following is an excerpt from Roy's Biosketch on his website: "Roy Sewall spent most of his youth in India, Pakistan, Indonesia, and the Philippines; his State Department family's home base was the Washington, D.C., area. Roy has a BS in Physics from Case Institute of Technology in Cleveland and a MS in Engineering Science from Penn State. He returned permanently to the Washington area in 1969 and worked for several major technology corporations for over 30 years. Roy's interest in photography evolved from extensive travel in six continents. In 2001, he started his transition to full-time photographer. He always found the Washington area to be one of the most photogenic locations in the world."



What was your very first camera?

Baby Brownie

What do you consider essential gear to take on a shoot, particularly if you need to travel light?

Tripod & head, camera body with L-bracket, 24-70 f/2.8 with lens hood, 70-200 f/2.8 with stabilization and lens hood, polarizers, wired shutter release, small backpack or belt with pouches

What person, place, or thing inspired you to become a photographer? Why?

The desire to hunt for interesting things to see. I have found that photography greatly increases one's visual awareness of our world. Photographers see things much better than mere mortals.

Which 3 people, living or dead, would you like to have for dinner and conversation? Why?

My grandfather (passed away in 1951), a Presbyterian missionary in China who took many photos there; I have his entire collection.

Brooke Shaden (alive), a master of mystery-oriented composite photography. How does she come up with all those great ideas??

Bruce Dale (alive), National Geographic photographer–I have had dinner with him and he is a fabulous story-teller

What is one piece of advice you would like to offer to others on following their bliss in photography?

Continuously seek really objective critique of your work, but don't ever let other people change where you want to go with your photography.

Collector's Corner Zeiss Contessa By Gordon Risk

Founded in 1846 in Jena in East results with a hand held meter. Central Germany, Zeiss began as an optics designer and manufacturer. In 1926, they merged with other established camera manufacturers of the day in Dresden, also in East Germany. This was similar to what George Eastman did to enlarge Kodak.

After World War II in 1946, the

company opened another plant in Stuttgart, West Germany, leaving Communist East Germany. A dispute over trademarks ensued with the eastern bloc countries that continued to produce photographic equipment. As a result, the East used the "Zeiss" name and the West used "Zeiss Ikon."

My Zeiss Ikon Contessa was made in Stuttgart around 1953 -55. It is a 35mm camera with a built in rangefinder similar



the Super to Ikontas I reviewed the in last "Collector's Corner." The round rangefinder window above the lens is coupled to the viewfinder in the rear of the camera and also the focusing ring around the lens. An uncoupled exposure meter is built into the body. That means

that after taking an exposure reading you have to manually set the shutter. Then cock the shutter, focus, compose and fire, not forgetting to wind the film with the knob on the bottom of the camera, making it ready for the next exposure.

This model is the second of the Contessa cameras of this design, starting in 1950 and ending in 1955. After that, the Contessas were a more conventional design of the 60s. My Contessa came with a case which has kept it in excellent condition, except for the selenium exposure meter which


I am just finishing the final edits very profound articles on what the Naval Academy has and changes to my 37th book, meant to their lives. I was pleased and honored to meet "Naval Academy Annapolis." them all.

My Naval Academy Annapolis book, like my first book on the Academy, is the most complete book ever made on what happens behind the gray stone walls. I have every department of academics, professional development and



military training, including surface vessels, submarines, Marine Corps training, Naval Aviations and Marine Corps Aviation. It also has details of what Midshipmen life is like.

I am keeping my publishing very "targeted." The Naval Academy still buys and loves books. The book is hopefully going to be ready in October of this year. [*Editor's note: The book just became available, so please talk with Roger if you're interested.]* Jeffrey Wolk and I just did a test of color separations for the book. I will talk more about color separations in another article, but they turned out perfect. I just signed an agreement with Governor Hogan to do a new 7th edition of "Maryland: A Portrait," with his foreword. That will also be ready later this year. For next year I hope to do a series of very small but very "arty" books. So all is not perfect in the publishing world but it is looking much better!



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
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


