

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

What is Low Vision?

Low Vision is a loss of eyesight that makes everyday tasks difficult. A person with low vision may find it difficult or impossible to accomplish such activities as reading, writing, shopping, watching television, driving a car, recognizing faces and crossing the street. Low vision can be caused by eye injuries or by diseases such as macular degeneration, glaucoma, diabetic retinopathy, or retinitis pigmentosa. These conditions can occur at any age but are more common in older people. Normal aging of the eye does not lead to low vision. Regular medical exams by your Eye MD are important to diagnose eye diseases and treat those conditions that can be helped.

Goals as HPCA Board Member:

If I am elected to the Board of Directors, I would like to use my background, prior experience and lessons learned to continue to move Heritage Pines forward. I especially want to ensure that the Board continues the current commendable effort to improve communications with residents. Further, I would like to improve Board training, ensure that Board policies and procedures are followed, ensure that rules and regulations are consistently and not selectively enforced, and develop a sound long-range plan. Such planning is presently underway and it will be incumbent upon the next Board to work with management and the Long Range Planning Committee to conduct a thorough assessment and then develop and adopt a sound plan based on input from the community.

Questions for the Architectural Committee

The ARC would like to answer some questions that we get asked most often.

What changes to my property do I have to submit to ARC before I begin work?

Anything that can be seen from the outside of your property must be submitted for approval. This includes painting, all landscape changes, windows, lighting, lanai, birdcages, and roofs. attic fans, doors/screens (front, side, rear, garage) driveways, walkways, satellite dishes.

I heard there is a new paint book? What if I want to paint the same color I already have. Do I still have to submit it for approval?

Yes. There is a new paint book and there are more than 100 color combinations available. We tried to include as many of the current combinations that we could. *Everyone* must submit their color selection before they begin painting.

I had sinkhole testing and they left huge drilled circles in my cement on the driveway and on the walkway. Do I have to have a whole new driveway put in or pavers installed in order to comply with community regulations?

No. You do not have to rip out your entire driveway and put down pavers or a whole new driveway. You can have new cement put where the drilling took place and then you can have the driveway and or walkway stained.

If I decide to put pavers in my driveway do I have to remove the current cement?

Yes. Not only do you have to remove the cement on the driveway but you have to remove the cement all the way to the street. There must be a smooth transition from the public sidewalk to the sidewalk within your driveway.

How do I know if work being done has received ARC approval?

When a resident receives approval from ARC they are given a green Heritage Pines permit that should be in their front window while they are completing the work.

Is the ARC still doing inspections of the community?

No. As a committee we felt it was better to have the property manager conduct inspections of the properties within the community. If we see a violation or, if we get a

call from a resident regarding a violation, we turn them over to the property manager's office for review.

Is anyone getting fined for violations?

Yes. Our General Manager is reviewing and enforcing all violations.

We would like to thank all the residents who continue to keep their property in such pristine condition. Keeping up your property helps to keep the value of our community.

Heritage Pines CDD

A Community Development District (CDD) Workshop or Town Hall meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, February 12th at 2 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center.

At this meeting Pasco County and Southwest Florida Water Management District officials will make a presentation to residents on a proposal to provide reclaimed water for irrigation purposes in our community.

The presentation will address proposed funding of the project, construction plans, billing for water usage, distribution of the water within the community as well as safety and health issues. Questions will be addressed after the presentation. As many of you may be aware:

- Critical water supplies are being drawn down faster than they are being replenished
- Higher concentrations of pollutants in aquifers make drinking water increasingly unsafe
- Aging water pipes and infrastructure are creating a heightened danger of sinkholes.
- Using water for irrigation and fossil fuel extraction is increasing strains on the water supply, and raising food and energy prices.
- Desalinization is increasingly being used to supplement fresh water needs. This process is extremely energy intensive and expensive.

Fresh water conservation is an important issue for our community, state and country.

I encourage you to attend this presentation.

MULCH, MULCH, and MORE MULCH

We discovered in researching this article that there are many more kinds, colors, and shapes of mulch then we thought existed. Several of the reasons we use mulch are to conserve moisture, to reduce weed growth, and to enhance the visual appeal of the lawn and flower beds.

Types of mulch include organic such as grass clippings, leaves, shredded bark, pine needles, and wood chips to name a few. Mulches break down and enrich the soil by adding nutrients to the soil and plants. These types of mulches improve planting beds by letting moisture and fertilizer filter through the soil to the plant roots.

Rubber mulch is made from recycled rubber tires. This mulch has longer life than organic mulches and comes in a variety of colors to blend in or contrast with the landscape. Rubber mulch does not allow termites to bore through the mulch causing them to die of starvation. A suggestion when using organic mulch is to put a layer of rubber mulch next to the house for termite protection. There are quite a few reasons not to use rubber mulch. As temperatures rise, this mulch can get very warm and certain types of plants cannot survive. Another problem occurs when earthworms and soil microbes do not receive any nutrients from rubber mulch. They require decomposing organic mulch as a food source. Without this food source they will die and over time the soil structure will break down.

Plastic sheeting is another type of mulch. Holes must be cut into the sheeting for the placement of plants and needs to be large enough to let water get to the roots of the plants which can lead to a few weeds sneaking in. The plastics create water run off which can end up in the street instead of reaching the plant roots. They also keep essential air exchanges from reaching the plant roots. There is the extra expense of covering the sheeting with the mulch of your choice. Here again, this medium can cause rising soil and air temperatures causing damage to the plant material.

Rocks, gravel, or stones can be attractive mulches. Two big drawbacks are keeping moss and mildew off the stones, and the stone material does not add any nutrients to the soil or plants. Here again, the earthworms and soil microbes are affected by the lack of nutrients from the decaying organic mulches. Even though the stone material comes in a variety of sizes, shapes, and colors, it just isn't the best choice for your plants.

Among recommended mulches are: eucalyptus, melaleuca, cocoa shells, pine bark, and pine needles. One problem with all the mulches is keeping it in the bed and out of the lawn. This can be solved with an edging material. So when it comes time to purchase mulch, please keep the organics in mind. Joe Lamp states in <u>Garden to Make a Difference</u>, "A good layer of mulch will keep the soil temperatures in my garden as much as 10 degrees cooler this summer and help prevent disease in my plants."

These mulching tips are from Robyn Griggs' <u>Mulch</u> madness: Environmentally Friendly Mulch.

Mulching Tips

- 1. Allow soil to warm up a bit in spring before applying new mulch.
- 2. When mulching trees, mulch out to the tree's drip line but leave a few inches bare around the trunk. If mulch becomes hard and matted, fluff to allow air and moisture to get through.
- 3. Always check your mulch's freshness. If it smells sour or rotten, it could harm your plants.
- 4. Overly thick mulch suffocates roots. Most mulches work best in 2- to 4-inch blankets.

From Chef Tony's Cookbook



In the month of December, the ladies from WAG enjoyed a "how-to" event led by our own Chef Tony. The recipes below are the items which we presented to the class. They are simple & easy and residents will love trying them out!

1. Marinade for steaks or fish, chicken or beef. This is simple and was loved from the women at the W.A.G holiday event.

- 2 tbs brown sugar
- 4 tbs low sodium soy sauce

Heat a nonstick pan or a cast iron pan on your stove with a touch of oil. Take the meat of choice and evenly season with the brown sugar. Drizzle with soy sauce to wet the brown sugar then gently put in pan. This part will be a little smokey, this is forming the crust you want, don't worry just lower heat. Flip and cover if need to cook fully.

2. No-Bake Cheese Cake

- 3 tbs grated lemon peel, more the better

- One gram cracker crust

Cream cream cheese with a mixer. Add sweetened condensed milk and lemon zest on high speed; stream in the heavy cream to volumize. Scrape the bowl and whip again. Spread evenly into the gram cracker crust and refrigerate for 1 hour or longer. Cut and serve with fresh fruit or candied lemons.



Golf Pro Tip



Make Your Practice Meaningful

Obviously, the key to mastering both the basics and subtleties of shotmaking is practice.

At some tournaments, people will come by and watch me practice, and I'll look to them like a complete hacker.

First I'll hit a big slice, then, with the very next ball, a big hook. Then I'll hit one way up in the air, and without changing clubs I'll hit a low screamer. I'm simply practicing my shotmaking.

To my mind, this is the most enjoyable practice of all. And one of the nicest things is it's good training for your visualization and mental discipline as well. What I like to do is pretend I'm playing a particular golf course, and using one club, such as a 4-iron, I try to hit the shots that the course calls for.

Make Your Practice Meaningful

The key to mastering shotmaking is practice. If the first hole is a dogleg left, I'll try to hit a draw. If the hole normally plays into the wind, I'll try to hit a low second shot. Then I'll play the second hole, hitting a high downwind drive. I'll pretend that the flagstick on that hole is on the back left of the green, and I'll play a draw that will seek out the pin. I'll hit each of these shots with the 4-iron, hitting to a wideopen practice range. It's the ultimate test of your ability both to imagine shots and to play them.

Another great way to practice your shotmaking is to take a bag of golf balls and toss them into some of the worst places possible-into fairway bunkers, behind trees, onto difficult lies. Then try to get the balls out of those positions in at least two different ways.

If, for instance, you're blocked by a tree, try to hit a high shot over it as well as a draw or fade around it. This type of practice is, after all, the real thing. It also forces you to develop your imagination.

Knowing how to hit these shots is of comparatively little value if you can't recognize the opportunities to play them. So get used to your talent at bending the ball, and test the limits of that talent.

Once you know what you can and can't do from various lies, you'll "see" shots you've never seen before. It's the combination of that talent and vision that will enable you to play aggressively from almost any lie.





Ask The Techie

Q: Recently my Yahoo email had been hacked. My email account was being used to send SPAM messages to people on my Contact List. I called Yahoo at a number I found on the Internet to request assistance in



changing my password. Instead the person took over remote control of my computer. He told me that my computer, printer and Internet connection were all infected and I needed to pay several hundred dollars to have these problems corrected. I hung up and contacted you for assistance. Was I actually speaking to Yahoo support or was this a scam?

A: This was definitely a scam. The free email providers: **Yahoo, Hotmail, Gmail** don't normally provide phone support. They typically provide support via their web sites or via email from their technical support departments.

One must be careful when searching the Internet for contact information. Anyone can create and web site representing themselves as affiliated with a company. This is not only true with technical companies but also with the banks, credit card companies and other financial institutions. If you are looking for contact information the best place to look is at their web site. Look for a **CONTACT US** link somewhere on the site.

If you ever allow someone to access your computer remotely and feel they may not be who they say they are, you should have your computer checked for viruses and other monitoring software. This type of software may be used for unauthorized access to your computer without your knowledge or permission.

Q: I would like to be able to view Netflix movies on my TV. What is the most economical way to get this done?

A: Many of the new TV's and Blu-ray DVD plays include built in wireless Internet and support **Netflix, Pandora** and other entertainment options. Many of the game systems such as the **Wii, PlayStation** and **X-Box** offer similar capabilities.

An excellent low cost option for wireless Internet entertainment is a **ROKU** player. There are several models available. They cost \$45-\$75 depending on whether you have a High Definition or an older Standard Definition TV.

Regardless of the device you select, you must have a have a wireless router and an Internet connection capable of supporting the higher requirements of streamlining video. If you experience pixilation or screen freezes, you may need to upgrade your Internet service to a faster speed.



Tai Chi Class

<u>Tai Chi</u> – Beginner – Tuesday at 8:30 a.m. in PAC Advanced – Thursday at 8:30 a.m. in PAC <u>Qigong</u> (Chee Kung) – Saturday at 8:30 a.m. in PAC

What is Tai Chi? Tai Chi has evolved over hundreds of years from a Chinese martial art into a <u>simple</u> and <u>gentle</u> exercise that has many health benefits for <u>all ages</u>. Tai Chi practice raises *chi*, or life energy, which strengthens the immune system, improves health, and whole body energy (or jin), also called intrinsic energy, which improves coordination. As practice evolves, feet, legs and pelvis, spine, arms, and hands feel more connected, and the movements of head and body begin to feel coordinated. There comes a



time when breathing and movements of all parts of the body follow one rhythm (jin).

Tai chi movements build energy gradually; generate warmth; and a sense of completeness. After a half hour of practice, you can feel this energy as heat in certain parts of the body (especially the hands). Each posture cultivates a different kind of energy flow. The role of the individual student, in the process, is to try, through tai chi, to create the conditions in which energy can flow and to give the body time to heal itself.

Tai Chi teaches people to become alert to intelligence from within while learning to listen to what is happening outside and to respond to others. It teaches patience, the ability to wait, poised and quiet, for the moment to move or act. When Tai Chi movements are performed correctly, they work to calm and focus the mind, so that mind, energy, and body work in harmony.

Tai chi is quality movement. It is physically demanding, yet it works with the body to encourage the gradual developing of strength and reviving of natural openness and coordination. The movements of Tai Chi continually turn the spine, an action that gradually repositions misplaced organs, stimulating them at the same time through an internal form of massage. These same movements also dissipate excess nervous tension held in the body and help balance the nervous system. Practicing tai chi encourages the joints to open, that is, to relax completely, thus increasing the mobility in all joints of the body; maintaining an especially strong focus on the ankles, knees, hips, shoulders, elbows, wrists, and spine.
