TREASURER'S REPORT

As anticipated the November Financial Statement exhibited a positive turn-around from October 2015.

Operating Fund: Y/T/D Financial Results November 2015

- Year to date profit increased to \$122,000 from \$100,000 on October 31, 2015.
- November Revenue was \$41,000 under budget. Expense was \$12,000 under budget.
- In comparison, there was a profit of \$22,000 compared to a profit of \$21,000 in November 2014.
- Food and Beverage revenue for November was \$16,000 under budget. Expense was \$1,000 under budget. Year to date there is a loss from budget of \$89,000. This is up from \$73,000 at October 31st. The loss from F&B for November is \$1,000 less than November 2014.
- Golf Revenue for November was \$26,000 under budget. Expense was over budget by \$3,000.
- Year to date there is a loss of 91,000 up from October of 62,000.
- The loss from Golf was \$7,000 less than November 2014.
- Year to date payroll and benefits were under budget by \$25,000 compared to \$27,000 in October.
- FTEs came in at 69.49 over the revised forecast of 66.70. The October rate was 64.99.
- Operating Cash is \$857,000 virtually the same as October

In summary, I still remain positive about our financial condition. However, I had hoped that the recovery from October would have been larger.

My forecast has changed to a profit of 160,000 and an after audit profit of 80,000.

GOLF COURSE GROUNDS DEPARTMENT

We have had a busy fall preparing the course and common areas for the winter months. Thanks for all the positive comments and support as we continue to augment our planting beds with additional color. Our Request For Proposal has been sent out to several Landscape Architects to assist us in developing a master plan to improve the overall aesthetics of the community.

We are looking forward to implementing the plan next spring after an architect has been chosen. We'll keep you posted. The course continues to improve as we have been actively spraying late season weeds and applying fertilizers to promote healthy turf as we move into the winter months. Our pigment application program for greens and fairways has yielded improved color and turf density. The tees have been over seeded with ryegrass and are filling in nicely. We look forward to seeing you on the course often in 2016!

Happy New Year Everyone! We hope you all enjoyed the Holiday Season. As part of our commitment to Heritage Pines, we would like to highlight our Architectural Control inspections. Below are just a few reminders:

- Check your driveway and walkway to see if it is in need of cleaning;
- ✓ Have your overgrown trees trimmed;
- ✓ Only three ornaments and three potted plants in the front yard and in the backyard, are allowed. (Please refer to the ACC Manual, Section 10.6 Ornaments, Page 31);
- ✔ Check your roof to see if it is in need of cleaning;
- ✓ Trim bushes to no more than 6" above the window sill, no more than 3' at the end of the driveway, and no more than continue to next page

4' for all others. (Please refer to the ACC Manual, Section 5.2.1, Page 18).

- ✓ Please be sure to trim any plantings around the lamppost.
- ✓ Lamppost please be sure your lamppost is as originally installed by the builder.

As per the ACC Manual, please be sure your lamppost is as originally installed by the builder. We have received reports that some residents may have installed a different lamppost without approval from the Architectural Control Committee. This is a violation of the Architectural Control Policy Manual. Should you need to replace your lamppost, please submit an ECR application to the ACC for their approval. All lamppost information is available at the front desk.

Also, please take the time to either check your lamppost or arrange for someone to check it for you so our entire community is in compliance with our rules. This is important to our community as emergency services rely on these lights during emergency situations. Please keep in mind, nonworking lampposts are considered a property violation.

Please keep in mind, if you are a seasonal resident, it is your responsibility to maintain the property in your absence. We realize this can be an inconvenience to some. ARCHITECTURAL CONTROL COMMITTEE

Welcome back from the Holidays, please insure that all Christmas/Hanukkah & New Year's decorations are removed by January 10. More information on Holiday Decorations can be found in section 10.9 of the Architectural Control Manual.

Section 10.1 Garbage and Trash states "All garbage, cans and other recyclable containers must be kept inside the garage. A plastic trash bag is not considered a container. Trash or garbage must ONLY be put out the morning of pick up. All food refuse must be placed in a covered receptacle to avoid invasion from animals. Empty receptacles must be removed from sight on the same day of pick up. Trash must not be accumulated or stored on the outside of the home. A garbage container is defined as plastic or metal having a covered top." All residents should be using their blue container distributed earlier this year.

Can I Have Beautiful Flowers With Reclaimed Water?

Florida-Friendly Landscaping (FFL) means using lowmaintenance plants and environmentally sustainable practices. Learn how you can have a beautiful landscape that could save you time, energy, water and money while protecting our future.

Florida-Friendly Landscape becomes an asset to the environment, protecting natural resources and preserving the state's unique beauty. Recognizing the home landscape as part of a larger natural system will help you make sound decisions in creating a Florida-Friendly yard using reclaimed water. Reclaimed water costs less than most other water sources. It reduces fertilizer use, as some nutrients like nitrogen and phosphorus remain in the water; it reduces disposal into waterways, which can help reduce nutrient loads in bays and rivers and it is a sustainable and cost effective water supply. It also reduces stress on drinking water supplies.

Many lovely plants can do well with reclaimed water, Blue Porterweed, Caladium, Crape Myrtle, Ixora, Pentas, Rose, Bird of Paradise, Croton, Daylilies, Gerbera Daisy, Liriope, Pampas Grass, Society Garlic, Southern Magnolia. And then a wonderful variety of plants that are completely tolerant of reclaimed water are Bougainvillea, Coontie, Dahoon Holly, Dwarf Oleander, Hibiscus, Lantana, Mondo Grass, and Pittosporum.

LONG RANGE COMMITTEE

Completed and Approved by Long Range Planning Committee - Chair, Pat Liston

The Long Range Planning Committee gathers data to identify the ongoing needs, culture and strategic future of Heritage Pines. They strive for transparency. They gather both quantitative and qualitative data. Both raw data and synthesized data are shared with the community. The Long Range Plan 2016 "The Best Way To Predict the Future....Is To Create It!" condensed their findings to two strategic issues: Enhance Community Value and Maintain a Fiscally Sound Environment.

The strategic issue regarding "The Aging Community" continues to be of high importance. With the help of community representatives, a comprehensive survey was completed November 6, 2013. There were 1664 survey responses which were sealed and sent to Pasco/Hernando State College for analysis. The major finding is the age of our residents of Heritage Pines form a perfect bell curve with the age 71 in the center. This will be the relevant quantitative data guiding future planning.

In April 2015 a SWOT (strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, threats) analysis was completed by 92 residents who volunteered to participate. The raw data was posted on the website and was used by some committees in their planning. The chart below was derived by taking the most frequent responses and listing them under four categories. The four categories arose from the analysis of the internal and external threats and opportunities articulated by this outstanding group.

The Long Range Planning Committee's next steps is to facilitate focus groups. They also research ideas to interpret data collected from focus groups in order to provide direction to Heritage Pines. New residents will be invited to our first focus group. We have 198 new residents living in 125 new homes in the 2015 year so their input will certainly be dynamic. Again, the data from our focus group will be shared with our community and guide future planning. The Long Range Planning Committee extends to everyone our warmest wishes for 2016.

Now is the time for all of us to pay for our pre-paid golf fees for 2016 as well as for GHIN. GHIN is the computation service used by Heritage Pines to establish and maintain handicap information. It is a requirement to have a handicap in order to participate in league, couples as well as other events – i.e. Village Tournament, etc. It is also a requirement to POST ALL ELIGIBLE SCORES. If you have an 18 hole handicap and only play 9 holes, POST the 9 hole score. The GHIN system will keep track of these scores and combine with the correct rating/slope to make an 18 hole score.

If you are changing from a 9-hole handicap to 18-hole, now is the time to make the change. Please see Rick Weber, in the ProShop for making this change.

As you are making your New Year's Resolutions, add posting scores to your list. It is an easy resolution to keep.

ASK THE TECHIE

Q: Recently my Yahoo email had been hacked. My email account was being used to send SPAM messages to people on my Contact List. I called Yahoo at a



number I found on the Internet to request assistance in changing my password. I allowed the person to take over remote control of my computer. He told me that my computer, printer and Internet connection were all infected and I needed to pay several hundred dollars to have these problems corrected. I hung up and contacted you for assistance. Was I actually speaking to Yahoo support or was this a scam?

A: This was definitely a scam. The free email providers: Yahoo, Hotmail, Gmail don't normally provide phone support. They typically provide support via their web sites or via email from their technical support departments. If you actually reached a Yahoo support person they would not have charged you to change your password. They also would not have done any troubleshooting of your computer or printer.

One must be careful when searching the Internet for contact information. Anyone can create a web site representing themselves as affiliated with a technology company. This is the case with technical companies but also with banks, credit card companies and other financial institutions. If you are looking for contact information the best place to look is at their web site. Look for a CONTACT US link somewhere on the site.

If you ever allow someone to access your computer remotely and feel they may not be who they say they are, I recommend you have your computer checked for viruses and other monitoring software. This type of software may be used for unauthorized access to your computer without your knowledge or permission.

Similarly, if you receive an unsolicited phone call from someone claiming to be from Microsoft, Symantec or Hewlett Packard telling you that they have detected problems on your computer and want to access your computer hang up immediately. This is DEFINITELY a scam.

Q: My computer is running slowly and I suspect it may be infected with a virus. My neighbor suggests I use Windows System Restore to correct this problem. Do you agree that this will fix my problem?

A: System Restore is a very powerful tool that I occasionally use to bring a troubled computer back to life. However this tool should be used ONLY as a last resort when all other corrective actions have failed. Depending on how far back the restore is done the system may not always complete the process successfully. I've seen systems that have been restored multiple times fail completely requiring replacement or Windows reinstallation.

If the System Restore appears successful, you should verify that the virus has been completely removed. Often the virus, if not completely removed, will reinfect the system again after a short period of time.
