# GOLF COURSE AND GROUNDS DEPARTMENT NEWS

Best Regards from the grounds maintenance department. It looks like summer has finally arrived with both seasonal temperatures and consistent rainfall. With the overnight temperatures remaining in the 70s on most evenings our warm season turf has responded with new horizontal growth and renewed vitality. Our fertilitity programs have been put into place this season to take advantage of the summer growing weather. Curfew was applied to select fairways and tees on 6/10to control nematodes. These pests are actually microscopic worms that feed on turf. Chemical controls are utilized in addition to cultural practices and targeted fertility programs to negate the effects of these pests. Our teeboxes are currently transitioning from ryegrass planted last fall to the existing bermudagrass. Several are thin and a couple may need to be sodded. The most severely affected are on holes 6 and 17. Our strategy for recovering the bermudagrass will be a combination of vertical mowing, aerification, fertilizer and sand topdressing. This process will help the tee surfaces recover faster and improve turf density and smoothness.

Our Common Grounds redesign is underway. Our initial design review will be presented to the Common Grounds Committee in the next few weeks. We'll keep you posted. In the meantime we are forging ahead with sod work and the addition of new plantings in the end caps along Grand Club and Scenic Hills Blvds. In addition all turf areas have been treated with fertilizer and insecticide to ensure a successful summer season. Looking forward to seeing you in the neighborhood!

### COMMUNITY CELEBRATION FOR "PALEO PARK -THE ELLIOTT SITE 8PA596"

Please join us as HPCA celebrates the State recognition of our own Paleo Park!! Mark your calendars for a wonderful community celebration to be held on Wednesday, July 13.

The Paleo site is recorded by the State of Florida, and listed in the Florida Master Site file in the records of the Bureau of Historic Preservation. The first residents of Heritage Pines, Herb and Paula Elliott, became interested in the archaeological site and began their search for artifacts in 1999 and continued until 2004. The rest is a matter of record identified by the State of Florida as Paleo Site # 8PA596 also known as the Elliott Site after a donation of 4,000 artifacts by the Elliotts.

The Board approved the name change to "Paleo Park the Elliott Site 8PA596." The re-dedication will take place at 11 a.m. at the

park and all are welcome. A luncheon celebration will follow at noon in the PAC Room. Tickets for the luncheon are \$13 and are on sale at the front desk.

# **PROPERTY INSPECTIONS**

As part of our commitment to Heritage Pines, we would like to highlight our Architectural Control inspections. Below are just a few reminders:

- Check your tubes. Many are missing or in need of repair (if your tube is missing, please fill out a resolution request and drop it off at the front desk);
- Check your driveway and walkway to see if it is in need of cleaning;
- Have your overgrown trees trimmed hurricane season will be here before you know it;
- Trim bushes to no more than 6" above the window sill, no more than 3' at the end of the driveway, and no more than 4' for all others. (Please refer to the ACC Manual, Section 5.2.1, Page 18);
- Please be sure to trim any plantings around the lamppost name sign;
- Only three ornaments and three potted plants in the front yard and in the backyard, are allowed. (Please refer to the ACC Manual, Section 10.6 Ornaments, Page 31);
- Check your roof to see if it is in need of cleaning;
- Lamppost please take the time to either check your lamppost or arrange for someone to check it for you so our entire community is in compliance with our rules.
- Name Sign We've noticed many residents do not have the proper name sign. Please understand, the name sign must be the same size and style as originally placed by the builder. Please refer to the ACC Policy, Section 9.2 (page 29). Should you need to order a name sign, please feel free to contact the Front Desk.
- Mailbox Post Numbers if you would like to purchase Acrylic Plastic Numbers for your mailbox post, you can contact Woodland Manufacturing at 800 705 4020 or online at woodlandmanufacturing.com OR you can continue to purchase the numbers from the Front Desk for \$0.25 cents each.

If you plan to do any work to the exterior of the home, please be sure to complete the Exterior Change Request Form (available on our website or at the front desk) and submit the plan and application to the Architectural Control Committee for approval. All applications **must** be submitted no later than 5:00 p.m. the day before the regularly scheduled meeting. The ACC meet on the 1st and 3rd Tuesday of every month. Please remember, if you live in a maintained village, the application **must** be approved by your Village first. All applications without Village approval will be rejected. Please be sure to refer to the ACC Policy for guidelines and restrictions.

We would like to thank everyone who continues to adhere to the deed restrictions and helps us to maintain the integrity and beauty of the community. Thank you to those who have received a non-compliance letter and promptly complied. # **ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES**

What Do Those "Audubon International" Signs Mean? Is "Audubon International" The Same As "National Audubon Society?"



Do you know why we have two signs entitled "Audubon International" as you enter Heritage Pines? Many of our newer residents as well as long-timers have asked what the signs represent. Here's the answer. The **first sign** recognizes Heritage Pines as a

"Neighborhood for Nature" through Audubon International's Green Neighborhoods program. Awarded in 2012, the award recognizes outstanding efforts demonstrating environmental awareness and good stewardship. Projects completed included recycling efforts, development of Paleo Park, initiation of Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day, habitat conservation, and community education.

The <u>second sign</u> certifies that the Heritage Pines Golf Course has met the criteria set forth by the



Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary Program for Golf Courses. Awarded in 2014, the certification recognizes accomplishments in sustainable natural resource management

and environmental stewardship. Program components included wildlife and habitat management, chemical use reduction and safety, water conservation, water quality management, and outreach and education. This is the only golf course in Pasco County to have received this certification.

What is Audubon International (AI) and isn't it the same as the National Audubon Society? The answer is yes and no. Historically, The Audubon Society might be considered the parent of AI. In the late 1800s, Audubon Society groups were established in many states including New York. The New York group ceased meeting by the mid-1930s, but was re-instated in the 1980s. The original mission of the group was bird protection and habitat management. However, the mission was expanded to include environmental education and sustainable resource management. As a result, in 1996, the organization began doing business as Audubon International to better reflect the true scope of its operations. There is no longer any formal affiliation with the National Audubon Society, but AI often partners with many of the Audubon Society groups to promote common goals. The mission of AI is to deliver high-quality environmental education and facilitate the sustainable management of land, water, wildlife, and other natural resources in all places people live, work, and play.

Heritage Pines should be very proud of these two designations. We need to continue to promote environmental awareness and be good stewards of our beautiful surroundings. For more information, please contact Sara Brundage at sarabrundage@tampabay.rr.com.

# COUNCIL OF VILLAGES

Rosie Tilton opened the meeting at 4:00 by introducing Bill Crusselle, Club Manager, to address the agenda questions.

### COUNCIL OF VILLAGES cont'd

**1. What criteria are used to set the price for tickets for events here in HP? The contract amount?** Some are priced at \$25 while others are \$16. Depends on how much we have to pay for the event. For example, some are \$700, some are \$3,000 + surcharges and also staffing costs. We don't know exactly how many will attend so setting a price is a gamble based on previous experience.

2. Does HP have plans regarding the condition of the exterior lighting and lampposts around the Clubhouse? Many need painting and all need cleaning. We are now in the process of looking at each individually to see if we need to replace those with bad bases and "paint and fix" the others.

3. What is the 2016 schedule for the HP sidewalk cleaning crew? Because the CDD has no equipment to power wash the CDD-owned gutter curbing, why can't the HP crew assume this task as they wash the sidewalks with CDD help to fund the project if necessary? The schedule is to clean the worst first. It is a continuing job. CDD considers curbs to be drainage areas which they do not clean. There were lots of questions and extensive discussion about who cleans sidewalks, when they are cleaned, and why curbs are not cleaned. Bill said he will get the answers to all the questions and e-mail it to Rosie for distribution.

4. It is still unclear to our residents about purchasing mailbox replacement numbers. We understand they can purchase a cheap, worthless, stick-on number for .25 which will never stay on the supports for too long of a time, or they can spend \$7.50 to purchase a special order number from out of state. Are the residents allowed to shop at Lowes, Home Depot or other websites to purchase a sturdy, more economical number, or will that violate ACC standard regs? Numbers are available at the front desk for .25 each. If you would like to upgrade, Rosie has a handout for a local person who does the name plates and address numbers at a reasonable price (see below). If you want to buy elsewhere, that is OK too but .25 per number at the front desk is a good deal.

5. This needs to be addressed at our next meeting. Myself and others I know call the gatehouse to let them know of people coming in, whether friends or a commercial vendor. Phone is not answered but a message is left on the answering machine. Later we get a call that someone is at the gate coming to my home. They never listen to the message machine. Annoying! Chuck was asked to address this issue. He explained that between 8-10 the phone doesn't stop ringing which creates an overload on the answering machine. At the same time the phone is ringing, visitors are coming in at the gate. The officers try to attend to both the phone and the visitors at the same time and sometimes the log is not updated quickly enough to get the names logged prior to their arrival and that is when a call is made. The answer to the problem is to have residents call as early as possible prior to their visitor's arrival, 3-4 hours would be appreciated and 24 hours is not too early. Resident noted that e-mail works well and Chuck agreed and asked that it be done 24 hours prior to arrival so the e-mail has time to be received and logged. Chuck noted that there is a frequent visitor form that gets your visitor in without a phone call - if you have put that name on the form. Also if your visitor is staying for several days, let the gatehouse know and they will issue a pass to that visitor which gets them in without a call. Bill noted that it is critical that everyone give the gatehouse an emergency contact number. That person could be out of the area but in case of an emergency we need to know who to contact if we needed to get into the house to do a welfare check. The number could be anyone who visits - family member, cleaning people, lawn service, neighbors, whoever has a key to your house. This form is on line but it has to have a signature and be an original. You can get it at the gatehouse and front desk. Another important thing to do is advise the gatehouse if you change your phone number. It would be helpful to give your visitors directions on how to get to your house once they enter the community.

6. In light of a Capital Expenditure Fund item of \$200,000 budgeted for 2016, and some discussion at the BOD meeting of ideas seen at Heritage Springs and the rumor mill of ideas going around, as GM what projects, in your opinion, are ready for more discussion or are coming to activation in the near future? The emphasis is now on two areas, the floor here in the PAC room and the pavilion across the street. The dance floor is dangerous because of it being taken up and put down sometimes 3-4x per week. Resident: Is it being considered to do the PAC room completely in wood? Bill: We are looking at three different types of floor covering. The same type of floor used in the hallway is preferred because of its durability but no decisions have been made yet. The PAC flooring is not a capital expenditure, but is considered a replacement and will come out of the reserve. The pavilion would be out of capital. The original plans for the pavilion are being looked at but there are no conclusions. New roof and expanded pad are all in the plans but not approved. We are looking only for preliminary costs so the board has a starting point. Rosie stated her (and residents) frustration at never seeing a capital plan come to fruition and wants to know who "they" are who are "looking into it." She asked for a different approach to how to get things done. Bill continued by saying that this is a new management team and he will not let this go away. He will push to get this done and is trying to share that mindset with us. He reiterated that the board knows this is important and also wants to get it done. There were 8-10 events this Spring under the tent and they were good revenue producers and we don't want to give that up. Resident: what is the process by which ideas come to fruition? Bill: All kinds of ideas are out there and you have to filter through to get to those that will best serve the community now and in the future, and the best way to go about it. We are doing that now by picking two and there is a third out there that is being talked about. To get ideas started people usually come to me or the board. It is a continuous process with conversations between myself, the Board, and the residents. Rosie: As the GM can you help us get a process in place so that we know what ideas are out there, have input and can comment on the conclusions? Bill: It's not so much just the

manager but also the board. We have lived thru all of the recent turnovers - GM and board members. Working together we will make this happen. I am here six days a week. Come in and talk to me, give me your ideas and suggestions. **Resident: Is there a "to do" list of projects when money is available?** Bill: There is for the reserve. I like working with a three-year plan and the board can say yes or no. It's all about planning and knowing what funds are available and being accountable. Going forward, once a process starts it will be transparent.

7. For years our Food and Beverage Department used as their office the room in the hallway by the restrooms and by the ice machine water dispenser. Perhaps we should move the employee break room to this room and use this very large room to relieve the strain in the offices by the front desk. Can't happen. The break room has a refrigerator, TV and is storage for our wine and liquor. The office staff needs to be where they are, not separated with some moved to another place. Space is very limited for everyone but this idea would not make sense. Wheelchair access to the stage is also now in that room. Bill: There is another project we will be taking bids on soon in order to become ADA compliant. We must redo the sidewalks in order to accommodate people entering the building for any outside functions which is the reason why the side parking lot is not complete. In order to have outside functions in here we cannot have people walking thrrough the dining room. In addition, everyone likes to compare us with Heritage Springs and ask why we aren't like them. We do \$1.2M in food and beverage as does Heritage Springs. About \$300k of their income is from outside events which means their residents are doing \$900k. Our residents are doing \$1.2M. They close on Saturday to do outside events and they have a separate dining area. They are not open on Sunday PM. There are a lot of differences which are part of this process and we are talking about trying to choose what is best for our community. We want to serve and please our residents - which is our job - so we have to look at everything very carefully.

8. We realize that the furniture was selected by the previous BOD. What was the final cost? What was the cost of the mirrors? Who selected the furniture? Why a new color scheme? Name of the company? Furniture was selected by an interior decorator and had to be ordered and manufactured.

**9.** Also what is the plan to replace the umbrellas by the pool? They are disgraceful, the colors are all gone and they are very difficult to put up. Umbrellas are ordered and will arrive within the week. The color is brown to match.

Bill shared that we have had a very good five months and had a very good May. We are working lean, covering our losses and everyone is working hard to be the best that we can be for HP. Rosie thanked Bill for being the Manager to come here and answer our questions but noted it would be nice if we got some new questions on the agenda; as some are being repeated.

### Resident: There is someone in Scenic View Estates who makes the letters too – no other info provided but if someone knows, please share.

**Reminder:** You can find the CofV notes under official business on the website under Villages under Council of Villages. The sign-up sheet for the next class on June 20th at 2:00 for board confidentiality is at the front desk.

### **Discussion:**

Rosie wants to reinforce what happened today and says she senses Bill's frustration. Lets use this Council to keep focused on finding the process that lets us go forward with projects that improve our community experience. Residents continued to ask who makes the decisions? Rosie asked why, if we have all these committees, aren't they part of a process, any process, in moving forward? She reminded us that we need to bring issues forward in a positive way so Bill doesn't feel he is the "complaint department."

## Resident: Lack of storage and office space is an issue. Is anyone working on it?

Resident: The Committee on Committees is making sure that committees know exactly what their responsibilities are and she thinks they have a committee that works with process. Bill: Nothing is approved yet but once committees are approved and committee chairs selected, they will interview and select committee members and this will go forward. There is no meeting in July. Next meeting is August 11.

- Tie down tents and other shelters

# ARCHITECTURAL CONTROL COMMITTEE

### By Mike Miller, ACC Chairman

Homeowners are reminded that when submitting an Exterior Change Request (ECR) they must use the newest form. Older forms will not be accepted and will be returned. The new form is enclosed and is also available at the front desk. Starting immediately a "red sticker" will be affixed to your ECR advising the homeowner to ensure their request is in compliance with the ACC Manual.

Requests for satellite dishes are increasing. We ask that when installing a dish they be placed inconspicuous as possible. The guidelines are covered in ACC Manual Section as stated below: 10.13 Satellite Dishes/Antennas and Weathervanes.

All installations must conform to County, State and FCC regulations and must be preapproved by ACC. Installation of satellite dishes must be in accordance with the 1996 and 1998 amendments to the Federal Telecommunications Act. Placement must be as inconspicuous as possible.

Dishes may not be larger than 36 inches in diameter. No devices may be located on any portion of the Common Areas.

Where necessary, reasonable architectural modifications to the device, such as a change in color paint, installation of shrubs or landscaping (and the continuous maintenance thereof) and/or other architectural camouflage designed to conceal the device may be required when installation of the device is not practical or impairs reception by being located in the back or side of the house. Such instances shall be considered in a case by case basis.

All installations must meet the minimum wind local requirements of the Southern Building Code in "latest edition" concerning wind resistance and other applicable requirements.

Home owners must not permit their devices to fall into disrepair or become a safety hazard. Home owners shall be responsible for device maintenance, repair and replacement, and the correction of any safety hazard.

If devices become detached, home owners must remove or repair such detachment within 72 hours of the detachment. If the detachment threatens safety, the Association may remove the device at the expense of the home owner.

# SURFACING

### **Functioning Values for HPCA**

At the beginning of the HPCA Strategic Planning and Committee on Committee Realignment projects, committee members crafted four statements that we believed could help each group maintain focus as we navigated through various discussions. Referred to as Functioning Values, for a lack of a better description, these two very different committees relied upon these statements to remind us of the importance of our task and the importance for us to build toward long-term sustainability for HPCA. The surfacing of these types of principles could influence HPCA's thinking and help redefine how we function as an organization.

Whether you recognize these proclamations as Functioning Values, Organizational Philosophies, or simply as a declaration of common sense, these types of statements can serve as guideposts for Associations like HPCA to help ensure effective and proper decision-making.

"The decisions that we make today must also yield benefits for the future Association for them to have been good decisions." Here are the four statements to which we have begun connecting: 1. What is good for the Association is good for the member; what is good for the member is not always good for the Association. This statement is a universal truth that we all know and can apply in a multitude of ways.

This value was cited as our first statement because it is the foundation for everything that we do. HPCA cannot make decisions which satisfy the Member but hurt the Association. This particular value was established to help raise our awareness of this ideal and keep it at the forefront of our conversations.

2. The decisions that we make today must also yield benefits for the future Association for them to have been good decisions. It is often difficult to look into the future and forecast what we as an organization may need. Still, it is essential that HPCA do this - not only for efficiencies, but in order to remain financially sound. Last year, HPCA voted down a \$5 increase in our monthly HOA fees for 2016 without really understanding how that decision could impact us in the future, or what difficult future choices we may be required to make. For us as stakeholders in HPCA, we must connect ourselves to supporting the long-term health of the Association and make decisions which are consistent with building an organization which will be capable of serving us today, tomorrow and in the future.

3. The Member's responsibility for the Association must extend beyond today if the organization is to remain viable tomorrow. Last year, a fellow HPCA Member told me that he wasn't concerned about the future of the Association because he wouldn't be alive to deal with the future consequences. This person was concerned about the benefits that he could realize today, without regard for tomorrow. HPCA Leaders must understand that not every Member will be concerned about the long-term sustainability of HPCA. And because of that, we also must not be influenced by individuals or groups who attempt to sway decisions that do not support the ongoing welfare of our Association as a whole. The most sound, stable and forwardthinking choices for HPCA must begin to surface now so we have time to have the "right" conversations.

4. Not all Members will support the decisions that are made. As humans, we are compelled to try to make others happy with the decisions that we make. However, it is impossible to make every HPCA Member happy with every decision. As long as we consistently make decisions which will benefit the Association now and into the future, those decisions will be good decisions. We must always position our Association as the primary beneficiary in everything that we do. When our Association benefits, HPCA Members will benefit by default.

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Your signature below acknowledges you have reviewed the Architectural Control Policy Manual and grants permission for the Heritage Pines Community Association Architectural Control Committee to enter onto the owner's property to review the application and to inspect the proposed project site before the work begins. Any work done on the proposed project prior to written or conditional approval of the ACC is a violation of the HPCA Restrictive Covenants and may have to be removed at the property owner's expense.

**NOTE:** The Architectural Control Committee will review this request. You will be notified within thirty (30) days of the receipt of a completed request. If construction/installation is not commenced within the time set by the ACC in the written approval (but in no event later than ninety (90) days after such approval) the approval shall be deemed rescinded. The resident must request an extension (within one year of approval) and receive new paperwork. Otherwise new paperwork must be submitted.

The homeowner, upon signing this application, understands that the Architectural Control Committee functions to act on behalf of the Board of Directors of Heritage Pines Community Association, Inc. on the acceptability of the appearance of changes to the exterior of buildings or land. There is no intention, expressed or implied, to approve or disapprove any apparatus, its function, contractor or subcontractor. The maintenance of operation or appearance of any installation is the homeowner's responsibility.

If it should be necessary for you or the contractor to run vehicles or equipment over common grounds to do work at your home or on your property, you must first obtain permission from the General Manager and Village Board (if applicable) before any work can begin. Any damage caused must be repaired at the homeowner's expense. Before any work on the property begins it is suggested that the homeowner informs the contractor, or people doing the work, that it is their responsibility to repair any damages done to common grounds by their equipment. Ultimately the homeowner will incur all expenses related to damages

# LIGHTING SAFETY TIPS



- If you see lightning, even in the distance, get off the golf course immediately. Strong thunderstorms can develop quickly.
- Rush to a dense, wooded area. Lone trees are dangerous.
- When caught in the open, fall to your knees. Follow this procedure immediately if you feel the hair on your arms or head rise.

Get rid of your umbrella. Even

umbrellas with nonmetal shafts are dangerous.

•

- Stand well away from your golf clubs and never get caught holding one. In an electrical storm, golf clubs are perfect lightning rods.
- Get as far away from ponds and lakes as possible. Water an excellent conductor of electricity.
- Golf carts are not a safe haven. The notion that rubber tires ground electricity is a myth.
- Avoid the green. Greens are often a bit higher than the surrounding terrain. The flagstick is especially likely to be struck.

# GOLF HANDICAP SYSTEM

"Two basic premises underlie the USGA Handicap System, namely that each player will try to make the best score at every hole in every round, regardless of where the round is played, and that the player will post every acceptable round for peer review. The player and the player's Handicap Committee have joint responsibility for adhering to these premises."

That being said, I want to remind players to POST all eligible scores! It is the Players' responsibility to POST all acceptable scores, whether you play at Heritage Pines or any other course.

• If you play quota points and pick up after not making a point, record your most likely score – not to exceed your ESC.

- If you have an 18-hole handicap and play nine holes, record the nine-hole score. Let the GHIN system keep track of the nine-hole scores and combine to make an 18-hole score. It does NOT matter if it's two on the front, two on the back or 1 front & 1 back. This is true if you play either the front or back twice in one day.
- If you have a nine-hole handicap and play 18 holes, record the front and back separately.
- If 13 or more holes are played, an 18-hole round MUST be posted. Record par plus any handicap strokes that you are entitled to receive on the holes not played.
- If 7-12 holes have been played, post a nine-hole score. If 7 or 8 holes are played, record par plus any strokes for the holes not played. You must play at least 7 holes on the front or back in order to post a nine-hole score.

Scores from games that are not played according to the principle rules of golf cannot be posted. Some of these are:

- Limiting the number of clubs to be used is less than 14.
- Player uses non-conforming clubs, balls, and/or tees. Or when a player incurs a second breach of Rule 14-3. (NEW)
- When a player plays alone. (NEW)
- When a player ignores one or more rules of Golf and fails to post an adjusted hole score as required, or fails to record the appropriate penalty for a breach of rule. (NEW)

The game of golf relies on the players to post ALL eligible scores. This makes the game of golf fun and fair for all. As always, if you have any questions, please contact someone on the Handicap Committee or our golf professional, Ricky Weber.

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# ASK THE TECHIE

Q: Windows 10 has been available for almost a year. Previously you did not recommend taking advantage of



the free offer from Microsoft. Have you changed your opinion on taking advantage of the upgrade?

A: Microsoft began making Windows 10 available on July 29th for computers running Windows 7 or Windows 8/8.1. The offer is available for 1 year after the release date and is free. Unless Microsoft changes the deadline the upgrade will no longer be available after July 29, 2016.

In working with 75+ clients, who intentionally or inadvertently installed the Windows 10 upgrade, my experiences have been mixed. Clients with **Windows 8/8.1** systems had fewer problems than those with **Windows 7** computers. The clients that had no problems were in the minority. Most of the problems I've seen were software driver related due to an incompatibly with the new **Windows 10** system. For printers this was usually corrected by visiting the manufacturer's web site and downloading the latest version. In several cases, a software program that worked previously stopped working on Windows 10. In several cases a new version was not available requiring purchase of a new program. In one instance, a Windows 8.1 laptop lost Internet connectivity requiring the purchase of an external network adaptor to restore connectivity.

My philosophy is: "if it isn't broke don't try to fix it." Even though the software from **Microsoft** is free, you may not be able to successfully install the upgrade yourself. Microsoft announced that they will continue to update/support **Windows 7** until 2020 and **Windows 8.1** until 2023. The features in **Windows 10** are mostly cosmetic with only a few additional features that will benefit primarily their Tablet and Smartphone owners.

The reminders from Microsoft have been persistent and very difficult to avoid. I have a tool that I've used to remove the Windows 10 update reminder. However, once the update is installed, I recommend not attempting to uninstall it. Several clients who attempted this themselves had to purchase new computers due to problems that made their computer unusable.

#### Q: Can you provide some guidelines to help me know when it is safe to open email messages? A neighbor received a message they thought was from a friend and when she opened it her computer got infected with a virus that was very difficult to remove.

A: Even when using the best antivirus protection program available one has to be careful opening email. I suggest you pay attention to the **Sender** and **Subject** information before you even open an email. If you see a message from a source you don't recognize, delete and don't open it. Another clue that a message may not be safe is the wording in the email **Subject**. If the **Subject** contains misspellings, doesn't make sense or is inconsistent with what you'd expect from the sender be wary.

If you decide to open an email, think about whether the message is consistent with the sender's character. If there is no text just a link, clicking could result in a download that will infect

your computer. Recently, I've had clients receiving messages from friends with no subject and just a link in the email body. Several clicked on the link and their computers were infected requiring my assistance to remove the infection. Upon investigation, these emails were never actually from the friend. In one case, the friend's computer was infected sending out virus emails without their knowledge.

As an email sender you should always enter appropriate information in the **Subject**. If you're including a link to a web site, include some descriptive text so the recipient will know it's from you. I always include some sort of a signature too.

#### What is Tai Chi?

Tai Chi has evolved over hundreds of years from a Chinese martial art into a simple and gentle exercise that has many health benefits for all ages. Tai Chi practice raises chi, or life energy, which strengthens the immune system, improves health, and whole body energy (or jin), also called intrinsic energy, which improves coordination. As practice evolves, feet, legs and pelvis, spine, arms, and hands feel more connected, and the movements of head and body begin to feel coordinated. There comes a time when breathing and movements of all parts of the body follow one rhythm.

Tai Chi movements build energy gradually; generate warmth; and a sense of completeness. After a half hour of practice, you can feel this energy as heat in certain parts of the body (especially the hands). Each posture cultivates a different kind of energy flow. The role of the individual student, in the process, is to try, through tai chi, to create the conditions in which energy can flow and to give the body time to heal itself.

Tai Chi teaches people to become alert to intelligence from within while learning to listen to what is happening outside and to respond to others. When Tai Chi movements are performed correctly, they work to calm and focus the mind, so that mind, energy, and body work in harmony.

Tai Chi is quality movement. It is physically demanding, yet it works with the body to encourage the gradual developing of strength and reviving of natural openness and coordination. The movements of Tai Chi continually turn the spine, an action that gradually repositions misplaced organs, stimulating them at the same time through an internal form of massage. These same movements also dissipate excess nervous tension held in the body and help balance the nervous system. Practicing tai chi encourages the joints to open, that is, to relax completely, thus increasing the mobility in all joints of the body.
