



Message From The G.M.

We have placed the Clubhouse Renovation Project on a temporary hold because the Board of Directors wanted some additional time to consider two expansion projects.

First, we have an opportunity to add some bathrooms to the Billiard/Craft Room end of the clubhouse, office space for the staff and a conference room that would assist in eliminating the closing of the Magnolia, Craft, Wood Shop and PAC for meetings. Second, in our Long Range Plan Survey, updating the Fitness Center was one of the highest priorities, so we have a plan to upgrade all of the equipment and make it 40% larger.

Doing this expansion during the renovation project will save the association \$150,000. The Board and Management are exploring ways to fund this expansion project. We had a good month financially in January, all departments were better than budget.

As always, if I can be of assistance, do not hesitate to call.

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

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<u>Heritage Pines State of the Association Report</u> <u>January 29, 2010</u>

This periodic report is meant to keep residents informed about various aspects of their community and to help improve communications between the Heritage Pines Board of Directors (the Board) and residents.

The Board would like to acknowledge the outstanding work of our General Manager, the Department Managers, and Staff in achieving the excellent operational and financial results that are demonstrated in this State of the Association Report for 2009. In addition, the Board wants to thank the contract workers, committees and other volunteers for all their help during the year.

Board of Directors

The Board, with significant help from all of those individuals mentioned above, accomplished much over the last year including the following:

- Established Goals and Objectives for itself and the General Manager
- Conducted a formal evaluation of the General Manager's performance for 2009
- Finalized a settlement with Lennar
- Approved a major maintenance and repair program for the clubhouse and other facilities that will begin in the next few months
- Improved the Association's financial condition
- Conducted resident forums to afford residents an opportunity to discuss issues and board agenda items
- Developed proposed changes to the Association's By Laws and Master Declaration
- Created a Board policy manual which includes a new communication policy and a new payment policy document
- Approved changes to the Association's Rules and Regulations
- Re-organized committees into operating committees that will fall under the direction of the General Manager, and Board committees which will serve under the direction of the Board and,
- Established a Board Policy and Administration Committee and a Elections/Nominating committee

The makeup of the Board will change this year as it does every year. New goals and objectives will be established for 2010 to help the Board focus its energies on the more important issues facing the Association.

Settlement with Lennar

As announced to all residents early last month, the

Association reached a settlement with Lennar and signed a general release document dated November 30, 2009. The Board concluded this settlement was in the best interests of the Association because of a) the risks associated with proceeding to a final arbitration hearing which was scheduled for three weeks beginning in May, 2010 and b) the substantial amount of expenses expected to be incurred by the Association in connection with continuing the arbitration process.

The Arbitration Panel had already issued several preliminary rulings which, in the Board's view, were unfavorable to the Association. The Board was concerned both with the impact of the rulings and the Panel's receptiveness to the Association's case as a whole. Ultimately, the Board determined the risk/reward ratio for proceeding with arbitration was not in the Association's favor.

The tri-party agreement between Lennar, Heritage Pines Community Association, and the village associations for the construction of irrigation wells in the villages is not affected by the general release document mentioned above.

Major Maintenance and Repair Program for the Clubhouse and other Facilities

The Board has approved a major maintenance and repair program for the Clubhouse and other facilities. The program will start within the next few months. An updated engineering report received by the Association last year identified needed repairs for the clubhouse roof, siding, windows, doors and frames, port cachere, trellis and the gatehouse and pool house roofs.

In addition, the Association will be upgrading selected furniture and fixtures, repairing some of the roads, village entry signs, and irrigation systems, replacing three air conditioning units, improving the tennis court area, and performing other routine maintenance in the Clubhouse and on the common grounds. All of this was communicated to residents last year as part of the 2010 budget package. The cost of the projects will be funded from the Association's reserve fund.

Some of the major projects completed last year included: the renovation of the pump house by hole #5, the installation of a back up well, sidewalk repairs, a new billiard room air conditioning unit, new stage curtains in the PAC room, and a new grease recovery system for the restaurant.

Finances

For the year ended December 31, 2009, the Association had net income (revenue in excess of expenses) of \$206,999 which was \$206,999 better than budget and \$101,385 better than last year. The Association's total cash

balance as of December 31, 2009 was \$2,303,413 including the \$490,000 cash received in connection with the Lennar settlement.

Revenue for the year of \$4,199,222 was \$52,985 less than budget.

Excluding capital expenditures and transition expenses, operating expenses of \$3,684,635 were \$441,072 less than budget.

All departmental expenses were under budget for 2009.

Operating expenses for 2009 were not only less than budget, they were also lower than the 2008 spending levels by 7%.

Capital expenditures of \$99,731 were over budget by \$74,731. Transition expenses (arbitration related expenses) of \$207,857 were over budget by \$105,332.

The Association's ending fund balance (assets minus liabilities) as of December 31, 2009 has increased by more than \$2.6 million from 2008. The increase is due mostly to the elimination of the Association's debt to Lennar in accordance with the signing of the previously mentioned general release document and increases in reserve fund assets.

All of the above results are unaudited. The audited financial statements are expected to be available in April, 2010.

The Association's unaudited quarterly and annual financial results for 2009 have been posted to the web site for all residents to view.

Food and Beverage

The Food and Beverage (F&B) financial results for the year 2009 are \$26,394 better than budget and \$80,356 better than 2008. In addition, the F&B financial results for the Association are significantly better than other similar associations in southwest Florida. The improvement over last year, the positive variances to budget this year and the favorable comparisons to other similar associations are a result of hard work and effort of the F&B management team and staff. The lunches and dinners have been well attended each week and, in season, they are usually sold out. The special holiday events are all well attended. Outside revenue events for the year totaled \$144,436. Profits from outside events help to keep assessment increases to a minimum.

Golf

Golf financial results for the year 2009 are \$34,093 better than budget and \$42,554 better than last year. The improvement over last year and the positive variances to budget this year are a result of hard work and effort on the part of the pro shop management and staff.

The renovation to the pump house on Hole #5 and the back up augmentation well project were completed last year. Valley Crest (golf course maintenance contractor) continues to maintain the golf course in excellent condition. Concrete pads were installed to allow for additional golf cart parking behind the clubhouse and adjacent to the driving range. A memorial tree fund has been established and new trees have been planted on the golf course paid for with contributions from residents.

Rules and Regulations and Other Official Documents

Changes to the Association's Rules and Regulations

document and to its Design Review Policy Manual were made last year. A new Board Policy and Administration Committee was approved to help keep all of the Association's documents up to date; recommend needed changes; and help the Board to ensure its actions are in compliance with all official documents.

Safety and Security

The General Manager worked with the Community Watch Committee to re-write the security protocols last year. The protocols were improved and training was given to all officers by Allegiance Security.

The purchase of a new security vehicle was approved last year by the Board. The vehicle was funded from a security reserve fund established in 2006. The Board also approved procedures to enforce speed limits within the community.

In 2009, the General Manager became Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) certified and a Co-Incident Commander on our Heritage Pines CERT. He and the facilities maintenance employees makeup the Logistics Team and in a state of emergency will be here at Heritage Pines to protect the assets of our community during any emergency where CERT has been activated.

The Board approved the purchase and installation of security cameras. They will be located on the front drive, the rear cart parking area and one will be inside in the restaurant bar area. The cost of the cameras will be funded from the same previously mentioned security reserve fund.

Long Range Planning

To build on previous efforts, the Long-Range Planning Committee is proactively working on developing a longrange plan designed to provide a roadmap for the future of the community.

A survey was completed by residents last month. The results of the survey are currently being analyzed by the Long Range Planning Committee.

Earlier this month, the Board held a meeting with a long range planning facilitator and the Long Range Planning Committee to begin to become more actively involved in the process.

The Board will continue to fulfill its responsibilities to oversee all Association operations and looks forward to an outstanding year ahead.

Environmental Issues Committee

It has been a month and a few have questioned me on **Blue Bags**. What do you put in them and what day do they go out?

Good questions. I used to look at my neighbors and see what they do, but now I've learned that **Monday is paper day**. We recycle cardboard, boxes, cereal boxes, and all kitchen product boxes as well as newspaper. What you need to do is place all cardboard into one box or tie it up into a bundle. Or, put it in a paper grocery bag. Newspapers can go into a paper bag and left at the curb, too. But we have another option. You can bring your newspapers to the recycle area across from the Clubhouse. Our revenue for the newspaper recycling goes back to our community that way.

Now **Thursday is Blue Bag day.** We recycle the following items: aluminum cans, metal cans (food cans), #1 and #2 plastic and clear, green and brown glass bottles and jars. Please remove caps and/or lids. Please clean and rinse your items.

Blue bags may be purchased in supermarkets and super stores. All items may go into the same bag. Place the bag next to your trash can and they will be picked up properly. Remember all aluminum cans may also be brought to our recycle area and the revenue, again, will go back to our community.

At this time, I would like to acknowledge that our kitchen staff has taken on a recycling commitment and I will be reporting back at a later date on the process they are doing. Also, it came to my attention from a resident - a water saving feature. I couldn't believe how simple it was. When you run your shower water to warm up the water, save the run-off into a bucket and use it for your plants.

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

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



Pet of the Month




When our cat of 19 years passed away, our daughters thought we needed another one. They bought us a cute black and white cat from


Florida in February
