



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FROM THE GENERAL MANAGER

For several months we have been looking at the structure of our office staffing to find ways to be more efficient, eliminate the duplication of responsibilities, create an environment of support, and also provide better service to our residents.

In an effort to streamline office duties and to be more efficient we have reviewed all the job descriptions and restructured the office staff as follows. This realignment will start this month.

- Kimberley Norton, Office Manager – to work with the GM and BOD, oversee and support the office staff, and research all the discrepancies in the Associations Documents to maintain and provide consistency of the official records, policies, and procedures. Kim will also be working on updating the Heritage Pines web site.
- Terri Delaney, Property Manager – to manage the maintained villages.
- Dineen Robinson, Assistant Property Manager – to handle property inspections and manage both R&R and property violations.
- Michele Foster, Bookkeeper – to handle all accounts receivable and accounts payable.
- Celeste Nolan, Administrative Coordinator – preparation of the newsletter, work with committees, assist with property inspections, and general office.

Over the years and through many changes, various duties have been disbursed throughout the office, not always aligning them with the best staff member for the job. This is an attempt to match task to staff member, to cross train, and better serve the residents of our community. These are all very loyal and dedicated employees of the Association who come to work every day and work to make Heritage Pines the best that it can be. The next time you see one of them in the Clubhouse let them know how much you appreciate the work that they do each day.

FROM THE ACCOUNTING DEPARTMENT

2017 HOA Fees

Just a few reminders: The monthly assessment amount is \$185 per month for Heritage Pines Community Association. Many of the village assessments have changed as well. Please check with your village manager if you have any questions on that amount. You do not have to do anything to change monthly automatic debit amount if you are set up for ACH. It will be processed at the new amount.

ACH and Online/Email Services

If you are not set up for automatic debit (ACH), please consider this simple process. It's easy to set up and you don't have to worry about anything except deducting the amount from your checking balance each month. And in case you did not know, we never deduct your HOA fee before the third each month. We had many requests to hold off until the third from members that don't receive their direct deposits until then. Also, please consider doing away with paper statements. You can view online or have emailed. Just request an "Opt out of paper statement form" from the office, fill out and return with your email address.

Out of Town Mail Service

Recently it was brought to our attention that some mail does not get forwarded if the name on your account is something different, like a trust for example. If you are going out of town for an extended period of time, please let us know in the office. We can set your mail to go to another address so you don't miss important association mailings. Just remember to give us a call or email to change it back when you return home.

Member Charge (Jonas) System

We always ask that you bring your member charge card to the club for purchases. This just helps prevent charge errors. If you do not have your card, please do not sign your charge until you have verified it has correct member information at the top. Also as mentioned before, our Jonas system separates your HOA fees and club charges, so we need to have them paid separately. We appreciate that most monthly accounts are current and if not it is usually a one time oversight and we take that into consideration. Please keep in mind club charges not paid by the 20th of following month can be assessed a \$25 late fee as well as HOA fees not paid in the month they are due for.



TREASURER'S REPORT

Overall January 2017 exhibited a positive picture of HPCA financials. January had a profit of \$41,000 which exceeded the budgeted profit by \$19,000 and exceeded January 2016 by \$4,261.

Food and Beverage revenue was \$8,000 less than budget, but expenses were less than budget by \$15,829. Golf was only \$3,960 more than budget. Food and Beverage total was better than 2016 by \$3,337 and Golf was better by \$3,983.

FTE's were 68 compared to budget of 73. Cash in Bank (Operating) was \$1,228,000 which was above normal. This is due to the increase in dues and the income from golf deposits, plus no reclaimed water bill from Pasco County. Total revenue was 13,000 under budget and 28,000 greater than January 2016. Total expense was \$35,000 under budget, but expense was \$24,000 greater than January 2016. Payroll and benefits was \$1,500 under budget.

Finally, I appreciate the opportunity to have been Treasurer of the HPCA Board of Directors for two years. We have been able to turn a projected loss of \$300,000 for 2015 to a modest profit and virtually break even for 2016. Many thanks to the GM, Board, Controller, and Department Heads in achieving this turn around in HPCA financial condition.

FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

By the time you receive this article we will have four new Board members. The six candidates vying for the four open positions are well qualified and will make important contributions to the new Board. I would like to sincerely thank those who have served on

the 2016 Board for their outstanding contributions to a successful year and wish them well for the future. As all residents know, Board members are volunteers and they give a lot of their time in doing their best to make sure Heritage Pines remains one of the best places to live in Florida. Safety remains a major concern of all residents. Actions are underway to activate the Ad-Hoc Safety Committee to bring more focus on our safety concerns. The Board intends to make safe driving habits and speeding the primary focus for the committee. We are continuing to emphasize sustainable Long Range Planning goals as a number one priority. Additional focus will be placed on improving the revenue to expense ratio in a number of areas to include Food and Beverage and Golf during 2017 and another goal is to provide more transparency. We are exploring better space utilization in the main club and have developed some ideas of how to expand enclosed space which we will discuss in the coming weeks. From a financial standpoint, we had a pretty good year in 2016. The bottom line for 2016 was a loss of approximately \$16,000. We overran our 2016 budget by .003%. With all the uncertainties in the budget process that is pretty good. The two main reasons were a loss in golf somewhat attributed to the condition of the golf course and rumors that the

course would be closed for a substantial period during the year which impacted on the number of annual golf packages purchased by members, and decreased revenue in the first quarter of 2016 when there was a personnel change in the Food and Beverage operation and no events were scheduled for that period. We approved a very aggressive zero based budget for 2017, anticipating that we can improve revenues and expenses in both the Food and Beverage and Golf programs. We have also approved outside events which should reduce the gap between revenue and expenses in Food and Beverage. However if you read the recent article that was distributed to all resident addressing losses in our major revenue streams, balancing revenues and expenses in Food and Beverage and Golf is very difficult and is the prevalent situation in about 80% of the private clubs in the United States. Our job is to ensure the financial viability of the community, provide our residents the best amenities possible with reasonable costs reasonable and ensure that we live in a safe and secure community. One other point that should be considered is that of almost 20 amenities, such as tennis, pool, the swimming pool, etc, only Food and Beverage and Golf are revenue producing.

GOLF COURSE AND GROUNDS MAINTENANCE NEWS

Greetings from the Grounds Maintenance Staff.

We have received some beneficial rainfall the past few weeks that has helped to green up some of our dormant turf areas. These rains also help to alleviate salt buildup that occurs over time due to our reclaimed irrigation usage. Golf Course slicing has been completed as well as the addition of humic acid and calcium which will help to balance our soil chemistry as we prepare for the spring growing season. Water cooler stands have been repaired and repainted and we are currently refurbishing our ball washers and divot boxes.

The front entrance project has been completed with the addition of pot frames and decorative stone at the guard house and the planting of perennial peanut in the center planter on the flagpole island. The lighting has also been enhanced which has vastly improved the aesthetics during the night time hours by showcasing our plant material and architectural pottery.

Our featured plant this month is Podocarpus. Our community has recently planted this species inside the property along Duda Rd. The plan was to replace the cedar trees with a lower growing more attractive hedge that allows more sunlight yet still provides an excellent visual barrier. These plants are hardy, cold tolerant and are not adversely affected by effluent irrigation water. Once established they grow into a thick low maintenance hedge that will thrive with limited fertility in sun or shady areas.

Spring is on the way and we look forward to seeing you soon!

ROOF INSPECTIONS

We have completed the Roof Inspections; however, we continue to find more roofs in need of cleaning. Letters will continue to be sent. We have begun the re-inspections and second notices are being sent. If you have had your roof cleaned, please be sure to notify me via email at dineen.robinson@heritagepines.net or call me at (727) 861-7784, if you haven't already done so. Please refer to the Architectural Control Policy Manual, Section 7.1 Maintenance of Property/Exterior Painting, where it states:

"Owners must keep their driveway, walkway, roof and house free of mold and debris. Any stains (oil, debris, dirt) must be removed regularly."

If you do not have a current copy of the ACC Policy Manual, please feel free to stop by the front desk or visit our website (select Official Business and then Official HP Documents).

Here is a list of common property violations that you might find helpful to you:

1. **Garden hoses** must be on a hose wrap attached to the house or on a mobile station, or may be neatly coiled on the ground in a flowerbed behind shrubbery out of sight from the street, common grounds or nearby neighbors.
2. **Water softeners** must be screened from view from the street with shrubs (ACC approval required).
3. **Garbage containers** (ALL) must be kept inside the

garage. A plastic bag is not considered a container. All garbage containers can be placed at the curb the day before garbage or recycling pickup no earlier than 6 p.m. and they must be removed no later than 6 p.m. on the day of pickup. All food refuse must be placed in a covered receptacle to avoid invasion from animals.

4. **Lamppost lights** MUST be lit from sunset to dawn. Plantings around the lamppost must be maintained below the name sign.
5. **Bushes will not block a window** and will be trimmed to six inches above the sill. Any bush located at the end of a driveway will be trimmed for safety reasons to a maximum height of three feet in height. Bushes should measure a maximum of four feet in height. Bushes at the end of a driveway must be trimmed to three feet for safety reasons.
6. **Dead shrubs, plants and trees** must be removed immediately. This does not apply to plantings that appear to be dead due to "winter freeze."
7. **Driveway and walkway, roof and house** must be kept free of mold and debris. Any stains (oil, debris, dirt) must be removed regularly.
8. **Lawns shall be maintained** in a good and neat condition (regularly cut and fertilized, mulched areas be regularly re-mulched and kept weeded, bushes, hedges and other vegetation be regularly trimmed).

We would like to thank everyone who continues to adhere to the deed restrictions and helps us to maintain the integrity and beauty of the community. Thank you to those who have received a non-compliance letter and promptly complied.

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ARCHITECTURAL CONTROL COMMITTEE

As a reminder the new ARCHITECTURAL CONTROL POLICY MANUAL, Eighth Edition – Amended December 28, 2016 is now available online on the Architectural Control Committee Homepage and/or Office Business – Office HP Documents. The revised manual is also available in printed form at the front desk.

We recommend that all homeowners become familiar with all the recent updates and additions. Homeowners in maintained villages must first submit the request (Exterior Change Request) to their respective village ACC (or applicable review authority) for approval prior to submitting their request to the Front Desk. The request (ECR) will then be submitted to HP ACC for final approval.

Depending on the maintained village's recorded declarations, the HP's ACC may not approve a request previously denied by their respective village's ACC (or applicable review authority). However the HP's ACC may disapprove a request that has been approved by the maintained village's ACC (or applicable review authority) if it does not conform to the HP's restrictions or requirements.

The intent of the MANUAL's revision is to better assist the homeowners with information required when submitting an Exterior Change Request (ECR) and also provides general information of additional approved materials and additions to property. For your convenience the Amendment History is shown on page two and three of the updated MANUAL.

The Exterior Change Request (ECR) form is available in the monthly issue of The Pines.

If it should be necessary for you or the contractor to run vehicles or equipment over common grounds to do work at your home or on your property, you must first obtain permission from the General Manager and Village Board (if applicable) before any work can begin. Any damage caused must be repaired at the homeowner's expense. Before any work on the property begins it is suggested that the homeowner informs the contractor, or people doing the work, that it is their responsibility to repair any damages done to common grounds by their equipment. Ultimately the homeowner will incur all expenses related to damages

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


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
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NINERS LADIES' GOLF

purchase. Here are some DNA facts on one type of DNA test from Genealogy Expert Kimberly Powell:

Autosomal DNA Tests

Used For: Ethnic ancestry, plus relative connections on all branches of your family tree

Available To: all males and females

Autosomal DNA tests look at genetic markers found in the 22 chromosome pairs which contain randomly mixed DNA from both parents, basically all chromosomes except the sex chromosome, although some testing companies provide data from the X chromosome as part of this test as well. Autosomal DNA contains almost the entire genome, or blueprint, for the human body; where we find the genes that determine our physical characteristics, from hair color to disease susceptibility. Because autosomal DNA is inherited by both men and women from both parents and all four grandparents, it can be used to test for relationships in all family lines. As a genealogy application, autosomal testing was originally introduced as a tool for determining biogeographical origins, or the percentage of various population groups (African, European, etc.) that exist in your DNA. Labs are now, however, offering extended family autosomal testing, which can help verify biological relationships through the grandparent generation, and potentially point to ancestral matches back as far as five or six generations, and sometimes beyond.

How Autosomal DNA Testing Works

For each of your twenty-two pairs of autosomal chromosomes, you received one from your mother and one from your father. Before they passed these chromosomes down to you, the contents were randomly jumbled in a process called "recombination" (this is why you and your siblings are all a little different from each other). Your parents, in turn, received their chromosomes from their parents (your grandparents). Your autosomal DNA, therefore, contains random bits of DNA from your great-grandparents, great-great grandparents, and so on.

Close relatives will share large fragments of DNA from a common ancestor. Connections arising from more distant relatives will result in smaller fragments of shared DNA. The smaller the fragment of shared autosomal DNA, generally the further back the connection in your family tree.

Which Autosomal DNA Test Should I Take?

A number of different companies offer autosomal DNA tests, with a few offering databases to help you use your results to connect with other potential relatives. Three of the largest include (alphabetical order):

- **AncestryDNA** from Ancestry.com
- **Family Finder** from FamilyTreeDNA.com
- **Relative Finder** from 23andme.com

Testing with all three companies, if that is an option for you, will give you the best chance of matching with distant cousins. Testing your parents, grandparents, siblings, aunts, uncles and other family members will also improve your chance of making connections.

What is Qigong?

In past articles I have extolled the many benefits of Tai Chi & Qigong, and they are many and varied, but what is this thing called Qigong (chee kung)? Originally called daoyin, which means “guiding the flow of internal energy (qi)”, it has been practiced for over four thousand years in China. Qi, often translated as energy, is more of a verb than a noun – it means relating. It is the result of yin and yang (the two opposite forms of energy) coming into being. When a being arises, yin and yang arise and interact, and qi is formed. Gong is the circulation of energy produced by the relationship of yin and yang.

So the practice of qigong is cultivating a relationship with energy – becoming aware of the energy that circulates and flows through your being. Qigong is practiced in different ways as a spiritual discipline, in martial arts, and for health and longevity (this last benefit of qigong practice is the most widely accepted use in the western world, and is the focus of the qigong I teach here). Of the many forms of Qigong, the best known form is Tai Chi.

The Saturday morning class is devoted to learning, and practicing Qigong. Most forms of qigong are performed standing, however, if due to physical limitations you cannot stand too long, the benefits can still be attained by executing the moves sitting down. The exercises are slow and gentle and are structured to exercise both the mind and body, as well as

rejuvenating and replenishing the Qi or "life force" within you. Qigong is an energy practice, not a stretching or calisthenics exercise. All qigong exercises cultivate energy, flexibility, health, and awareness.





A: Microsoft has announced that on April 11, 2017, they will no longer be supporting the Vista version of Windows originally released in 2006. What this means is Microsoft will no longer fix problems or correct security breaches after that date. The good news is your computer will continue to operate and any software you are using should continue to function as it does now. The bad news is updates and new versions of existing program may not function properly on **Windows Vista**. Typically, one begins to see this happen approximately, six months after Microsoft support stops. In addition to the recently released **Windows 10**, Microsoft will continue supporting **Windows 7** and **Windows 8/8.1**.

If your computer is working fine and you aren't one who wants the latest and greatest software, you can continue to use your current system as long as it meets your needs. My advice is that if you aren't already backing up your personal documents, pictures etc. you start doing so as soon as possible. As with any electronic device the likelihood of failure increases significantly once a computer's age exceeds 5 years. If the component that fails is the hard drive your precious photos and documents are likely lost forever.

Since you are currently using **Microsoft Security Essentials** as your anti-virus program, you should switch to another program. When updates stop on April 11th, Security Essentials may not be able to identify or resolve any new viruses not previously identified in its database.

Q: I recently replaced my old Standard Definition TV with a new High Definition model. I am not impressed with the picture quality. It is nowhere near as good as the picture I saw in the store. What can be done to improve the quality of the picture?

A: The first thing I'd suggest is you verify your TV is connected to the cable/satellite box via a **Component** (Red, Blue, Green) or **HDMI** cable. A **Composite (Yellow)** or antenna **Coax** cable does not provide a High Definition (HD) signal. Older equipment that doesn't support HDMI may not be capable of supporting a high definition TV. If you are unsure, contact your cable/satellite company.

If the cabling is correct, try tuning to a High Definition channel. On **Frontier FIOS** these channels begin at 500 and on **Spectrum** at 1000. Channels below these are Standard Definition. If the TV doesn't display the HD channels you should contact your service provider to have HD enabled and to possibly have the set top box replaced with a HD version. If your TV service is via satellite, check the channel guide for the HD designation.

If you are viewing the HD channels check the cable box video setting is for 1080i resolution. The default box setting for a standard definition TV is 480i. This setting will result in poor picture quality on a HD TV. These settings are accessible via the **MENU** or **SETTINGS** button on the remote.


Big Balls! Little Balls!

Handouts: Website Tips - Getting e-mails from the Clubhouse, Update by Joanne Hughes - Chairperson of the Ad Hoc Elections Committee, Copy of e-mail from Pamela Lynch to Kim Johnson re: reclaimed water rates, Copy of newspaper article re: buying or selling a car privately, ACC Manual incorporating all current changes and the New Fireside Menu now in use.

The meeting was called to order by Rosie Tilton who introduced speaker Dale Mallek with an overview of the HP web site stating this is the first place to go for information. To begin, the address is www.heritagepines.net. Everyone who went thru orientation has a log in ID and a profile in this system based on the information given on arrival. It is up to each of us to maintain our info and if you need help, go to the front desk. Click on "**Resident Log In**" which brings up the residents portion of the website. At the bottom is your own user profile and this is where you can update info by clicking on edit. At the top of the edit screen is the tab "**Subscription.**" This option is important because it is where you can pick what information you want to receive from HP. "**Site Search**" allows you to search the website for any mention of what you are looking for. "**What's New**"

shows announcements and anything that has changed in the last two weeks. When you are looking for someone, go to the **"Address Book"**. Residents, staff, board members etc. are here. Search by last name, street name or address to find your neighbor. Click on their name and you will see anything on their profile. **"View Billing"** allows you to see your account before the monthly statement arrives. Official Business is the place to go a lot. If you are wondering about the CDD – here it is. Also the BofD, their meetings and agendas. If you want to see the videos, its all here. **"Villages"** gives contact information for officers, meetings, etc. and should be updated on a regular basis. **"Social Activities"** lists all clubs – again it is the responsibility of the club to keep the information updated. The newsletters are available here and are searchable – unlike the printed version. If you want to sell something, or give something away, this is the place to do it. In conclusion – this is merely an overview to show that the website contains tons of information for residents' use.

Who puts info on the website? Celeste Nolan

Rosie introduced Joanne Hughes, Chair of Elections Committee with update. The campaigns are on! Candidates have posted videos and held two Coffee with Candidates meetings with 54 attendees. There was Candidates Nite which drew 120 residents and was video taped. Envelopes were stuffed and 670 were picked up by residents. The balance were mailed. Ballots can be deposited in the lobby on February 20, 21, and 22. Elections Committee members will be there to assist voters who may be needing help with the process. Ballots can also be submitted at the front desk, any day, or at any time on February 23 up to 5 p.m. Sign up sheets for volunteers to help our committee on February 20-22 are in the lobby. We need about 10-12 volunteers for those three days, or parts of those days. At the Annual General Meeting we are needing about 20 volunteers to help open the ballot envelopes so they can be machine-counted by Pasco County officials. Again, sign up sheets are in the lobby. Joanne asked that we encourage our neighbors to vote. The amendments to our Declaration require 938 favorable votes to pass. Also, we need to vote properly. Last year 84 votes were not counted because the pink proxy form was not included and stapled to the ballot envelope. We created a video to explain the importance of the proxy form. Suggestions were given to make the process more understandable. The proxy makes the quorum for the General Meeting. We need over 700 people to make a quorum. We can't get that many people in person so we use the paper proxy.

Rosie went over the handout of a copy of an e-mail from Kim Johnson to Pamela Lynch (Pasco Co.). Kim stated: I know that the Board of County Commissioners sets the rates for reclaimed water and the last published rates were set in 2014. How is it determined when the various rates apply? Who determines that and where is it documented when it changes? Pamela's reply stated that the current rate to bulk customers is \$0. Our procedure has been that we determine this rate on a month to month basis depending on the supply of reclaimed water and weather conditions. Recently there has been discussion about increasing that rate to \$0.50 per thousand gallons. Once we have a billing system in place that is compatible with the meters,

these customers will be charged on a volumetric basis. We have hired a consulting firm that is in the process of doing a rate study. Once this is complete, it will go before the BofCC for approval. If the rates change, a formal notice will go out to the customers. Unfortunately I do not know the timing of this.

Next Rosie handed out copies of the 8th edition of the *Architectural Control Policy Manual – Amended December 28 2016*. This handout is to insure that each village, maintained and self-maintained, has a copy. The separate sheet states the changes made and is to be used as a quick reference.

The newspaper article written by Mike Fasano, Tax Collector was interesting in that it states you must let the tax collector's office know when you buy or sell a car privately. If not done correctly there could be dire consequences. Rosie turned the podium over to our GM Bill Crusselle to answer the agenda questions.

1. Are there Christmas bonuses paid to employees from the General Fund? Yes. Line employees only, determined by their tenure and whether full or part time. No department heads.

2. Shouldn't new capital installations require a vote of the entire community? For example: the pavilion, pickle ball court, dog park, etc. Such amenity additions would impact our ongoing budgets for maintenance/repair (i.e., staffing and addition to Reserve Fund). What does the Master Declaration say? Master Docs state that it is done by the BofD of your association.

3. Since the golf course was "privatized" years ago, shouldn't the restaurant also be exclusively for resident use? There seems to be more risk in having outside clientele for weddings than for golfers using our course. Outside golfers are more visible and smaller numbers (must register – names and/or id and less likely to "wander" thru the community) while wedding guests are unknown and attend in greater numbers (Pasco and Hernando Counties have high criminal activity). Golfers are more easily monitored for alcoholic consumption than wedding guests. Golfers do not bring children with them while weddings often have children in attendance. Golfers create less traffic when entering and/or departing the community. Golfers would not require additional security as do weddings – one security officer isn't sufficient to monitor exit traffic and multiple areas of the Clubhouse/parking lots. Golf outings turn common grounds into commercial property and you will then start paying property taxes. We are a not for-profit and pay no property taxes on the golf course. Weddings and private events are allowed up to 15% of revenue which we have never done.

4. The fountain in the red pot (near guard house) just spurts a small trickle almost not visible. Is it supposed to make a small fountain effect? It is a bubbler and not a fountain. We have actually increased height the water would normally go. We have installed a device to make the water go a little higher. We have had many compliments about how nice the area looks at night with the new design and lighting.

5. Why are some of the homes on hole #2 whose back faces the golf course are all moldy? Is it the village's responsibility to take care of this or the individual homeowner? If it is the homeowner do you fill out a solutions report to have it looked into? It really does not look good when you are on the golf course. It is the responsibility of the homeowner to take care of it. It is our responsibility to see if something needs to be done. The back sides of homes are difficult to deal with because we can only look at them from the golf course and then, only when the course is closed. We have one person to look at all 1406 homes to determine what needs to be done. This is being addressed with the upcoming staffing realignment by getting Dee some help in performing this task. We depend on residents to bring issues to our attention which will immediately be addressed.

6. Have the administrative personnel hours been changed? Numerous times I have called around 3:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. to be told the employee has already left for the day. Admin offices hours are 3-4:00 depending on scheduling. The front desk is staffed until 5:00.

7. What is the projected total cost for the landscaping project? How is this being funded? Architect \$8,109. The entire project – not including the architect - was \$124,727. Budgeted - \$135,000. Our all in total was \$132,836 so we are under budget. It is paid for in its entirety by the reserve. It has been in the reserves for some time. Phase II will be this year, Phase III next year. If we save money on Phases 2 and 3 it will go toward other projects. Reserve means replacement. The pavilion is not a replacement so it is a capital expense. The two additional islands past Scenic Hills on Grand Club may be added to the plan depending on the cost of the entire project.

8. What is the status of the pavilion project? Replacement of the bathroom roof will start around February 15. End of contract is March 31. We may need to put up a tent for March events.

9. Looking at revenue sources and extra office space, look at HP Property Management. Please help me understand why HPPM is \$20k in the red. Those villages that are being managed by HPPM are being subsidized by all the other residents. Why should all residents have to pay to make up the deficit? How many years have they been operating in the red? I believe HPPM needs to be eliminated. History – in 2005-6 all the villages were under club management. Things changed with Board and management changes around 2006 and the Villages were asked to find outside management. All but six did so. Years later with more Board and management changes began trying to get back the Villages that were lost which we are trying to do. Kim's goal in this area was to add two villages in 2016 which she did. On a side note – contrary to rumor, Kim does not have her own management company, she works for HP. Bill outlined Kim's many and varied duties. Back to the question, a resident asked for more detail about the \$20k shortfall. Bill put out the numbers and said we are continuing to acquire villages under HPPM. Staffing and realignment are part of the plan to fix the budget problem. Several suggestions were made to change the way money/time is budgeted and discussion continued in several directions.

10. I thought that an outside vendor or hauler would not be let into the community until 7 a.m. This morning, February 2nd, Progressive Waste entered our community at 6:45 a.m. and picked up our garbage at 6:54 a.m. Has the policy changed and if it has been changed, the entire community should be notified. The policy has not changed and the trucks have been seen waiting on the side of the street waiting for 7 a.m. to start. Our policy is vendors can begin work at 7 a.m. Bill will monitor the situation.

Rosie addressed the question about how the Council works and where the questions to the Council come from. The CofV is over 10 years old and started as a group of villagers getting together to discuss reclaimed water. We knew we were missing a lot of the community. The CofV was started with the concept that a rep from each village comes and speaks for their village. Questions come from not only the reps but from the community. Not all questions make the agenda. We don't take questions about the business of other entities or already-discussed issues with answers. All agenda questions are reviewed by the GM and sometimes by the BofD who have the opportunity to review. If either have justification to take a question off the agenda, they can and will. Rosie believes there is no dumb question, and everyone has the right to ask a question; also, if there are speakers you want to hear, e-mail Rosie to let her know. All questions are sent anonymously and will remain so. As of January all agenda questions go out on e-mail. The notes are e-mailed, and in the newsletter. Thank you for coming. The next meeting is March 9, 2017

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
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
