Although the members of the St. Nicholas Club hockey sextet put up a determined battle, the Boston Athletic Club team was victorious at the Iceland rink last night by 4 goals to 0. It was the sixth consecutive victory for Boston in the Eastern division of the United States Amateur Hockey Association and it practically clinched the title and the honor of meeting the team winning the title in the Western section for the national title at the end of the season. > Boston Defense Strong.

The story of the Boston A. A. victory, as has been the case in practically every game in which the Unicorn team has played this season, is in the superb defense which it has built up. It was this feature of the Bostonian's play that enabled them to defeat the New Havens recently. During the first such Havens recently. During the first quarter, the St. Nicholas forwards had pos-session of the puck almost as much as had the visitors but they were never able to break through the defense of able to break through the defense of Smith and Campbell and whenever the Beston goal was threatened, which was not often, McCarthy, Small and Geran came to the rescue. With few excap-tions, the shots that the local players got at the Boston net were from con-siderable distance out on the ice, mak-ing easy work for Lacroix, the stubby little B. A. A. goal. Jabez Holmes, the St. Nick goal, had an off-night, three of the goals scored

an off-night, three of the goals scored by the Bostonians being shots that he ordinarily would have stopped. In all he checked thirty-two efforts directed his way, not a few of his stops bordering on the sensational order. For the Nicks, Buntin and Cushman gave a St.

good account of themselves in the for-ward positions, while Henriques and Walker played well on the defensive. The St. Nicks threatened in the open-ing period, and only a sensational stop on the part of Lacroix prevented Townon the part of Lacroix prevented Town-send from counting shortly after the initial face-off. Early in the period the St. Nicks gave a fine defensive exhibi-tion, intercepting the puck time and again and not allowing the Bostonians to get in toward their net. After five minutes of play, however, Geran man-aged to pass Holmes while the latter was down on one knee. The shot was made on a rebound and went into the made on a rebound and went into the corner of the netting. Later on in the period Smith made a desperate bid for another goal, but his aim was a trifle wide.

To start the second period Buntin made a neat interception, carrying the rubber down into the Boston territory, but he was unable to make the shot. A short time later Small took the puck down the side of the rink and finding himself out of position, passed to Geran, who was waiting in front of the St. Nick goal, and the B. A. A. centre pushed it in between Holmes's feet. 'The former Harvard goal tender shortly afterward made a beautiful stop on Mc-Carthy, who received the puck directly in front of the goal with a clear shot ahead of him, and a little later he made a brilliant double stop on Small. The third Boston goal came after 9 minutes 40 seconds of play in the period, Rice making it on a pass from Small who in-tercepted the puck in the centre of the ice and then wriggled his way through the St. Nick defenses. Finding himself unable to shoot Small passed to Rice who was almost on top of Holmes. Enright accounted for the last goal Enright accounted for the last goal when, after 4 minutes 50 seconds of play in the final period he counted on a long shot which went past Holmes, "shoulder high.
