



FROM THE GENERAL MANAGER

This month will be a very busy month around the Clubhouse with several new projects:

1. The Board approved the Clubhouse renovation project and the demo of the

old plants should start the first week of this month. The pruning of the oak trees that block the view of the Clubhouse has been done and it looks so much better. It will also allow more sunlight and air movement which will be good for the new plants.

- 2. The wall (fence) that is going up behind the kitchen should be done this month. This will finally upgrade the appearance in back of the kitchen so that our residents and guests aren't walking past the trash cart, matts, grill, and employee smoking area.
- 3. The painting of the Clubhouse should also take place this month, weather permitting. We have had really good comments on the color and with the new landscaping the Clubhouse area should have a fresh and updated appearance.

In April, the financials again showed the positive turn that we have experienced the first quarter of this year. Food and Beverage was \$9,048 better than budget for the month and with the outside event food costs dropped to 38% which brings our year to date food costs down to 42%. Through the first three months Food and Beverage is ahead of prior year in revenue by over \$35,000. Golf also had another very good month and exceeded the total revenue budget again this month. This can't be done without the support of the residents. Thank you.

from your checking balance each month. And in case you did not know, we never deduct your HOA fee before the third each month. We had many requests to hold off until the third from members that don't receive their direct deposits until then. Also please consider doing away with paper statements. You can view online or have emailed. Just request an "Opt out of paper statement form" from the office, fill out and return with your email address.

Out of Town Mail Service

Recently it was brought to our attention that some mail does not get forwarded if the name on your account is something different, like a trust for example. If you are going out of town for an extended period of time, please let us know in the office. We

can set your mail to go to another address so you don't miss important association mailings. Just remember to give us a call or email to change it back when you return home.

Member Charge (Jonas) System

We always ask that you bring your member charge card to the club for purchases. This just helps prevent charge errors. If you do not have your card, please do not sign your charge until you have verified it has correct member information at the top. Also as mentioned before, our Jonas system separates your HOA fees and club charges, so we need to have them paid separately. We appreciate that most monthly accounts are current and if not it is usually a one time over sight and we take that into consideration. Please keep in mind club charges not paid by the 20th of following month can be assessed a \$25 late fee as well as HOA fees not paid in the month they are due for.

We understand that there are times when you have family or friends visiting and you are not able to accompany them to the Clubhouse or pool.

GOLF COURSE AND COMMON GROUNDS MAINTENANCE NEWS

Our first full course aeration of the season was completed in early May. This consisted of aerating fairways, tees, greens and roughs. In addition greens have been topdressed with sand to smooth the putting surface and help with thatch control. We also applied a complete fertilizer package that included a pre emergent herbicide for summer weed control. Our next single day course closure is set for June 8th. Our weed control program continues in earnest as we attack our summer weed populations. The pre emergent applied on May 10th will help prevent new weed emergence as we continue to spray post emergent controls to eradicate existing weed populations. Our summer targets on this property are mostly goose and tropical signal grasses. Our winter nemesis, annual bluegrass is finally fading away thanks to our improved treatment protocol and the advent of warmer seasonal temperatures. The Driving Range has also been sprayed for weed control, aerated and fertilized in conjunction with the rest of the course. Work on the new Driving Range building continues and should be completed in a couple of weeks. This new structure comes complete with a roll up door that will protect the Range Ball dispensing machine from the elements.

The Board has approved Phase 3 of our Common Grounds Renovation Project. Safari Landscaping will be performing the job as their bid was accepted by the Common Grounds Committee a couple of weeks ago. You will recall that Safari performed the Entry way phase of our project and did an admirable job. Project start date is set for early June and should be completed in approximately 30 days. We look forward to the finished product!

Our featured plant this month is Variegated Ginger. These plants have leaves that grow upright and are approximately two feet by six inches wide, are green in color with irregular yellow stripes and have a spicy fragrance. Variegated Ginger is usually grown for its showy foliage as it only flowers in the warmest of

climates. Flowers when present are tiny and grow in clusters of white or pink. The plant is non aggressive and can be grown indoors if preferred. Mature plant size is three to five feet in height and two to four feet in length. Space them two to four feet apart in landscape settings for best results and plant in full to partial sun areas. Looking forward to seeing you soon!

Driving Safety

Safe Summer Travel



Traveling throughout Florida can be nearly as fun as getting to your destination. During the holiday and vacation seasons, Florida's roads can be some of the busiest in the country. The Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles is committed to the safety of all motorists on our roads and educating everyone on safe driving to always Arrive Alive.

Tire Safety and Vehicle Preparation

According to the National Highway and Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), drivers in the United States put more than 2,900 billion miles on their tires each year with approximately 11,000 tire-related crashes. Tires are your vehicle's first line of defense on the road.

Buckle Up - Seatbelt Usage for Drivers and Passengers

All front seat passengers and all passengers under the age of 18, fasten their safety belts in Florida. Every time you get in a vehicle, no matter where you are sitting, buckle up. That click reduces your risk of being injured or killed in a crash by almost 50 percent.

Slow Down - Obey All Speed Limits

Speeding is against the law and extremely dangerous. Obeying speed limits improves safety by reducing the probability and severity of crashes. All motorists must obey speed limits and are responsible for knowing the speed limit on the roadway.

Drive Sober - Prevent DUIs and Drunk Driving Crashes

Under Florida law, DUI is impairment of normal faculties or unlawful blood alcohol or breath alcohol level of .08 or above. Driving impaired not only puts everyone on the roadway in danger, it can have serious legal and monetary consequences. Penalties for DUIs can include expensive fines, license revocation and jail time. Convictions can remain on your record for 75 years.

Plan ahead, designate a driver or call a ride service – it is much cheaper than a DUI arrest. If you see an impaired driver on the road, don't hesitate to contact local law enforcement or dial *FHP (*347). This call could save a life.



COUNCIL OF VILLAGES NOTES

Bill Crusselle, General Manager

The Board voted to approve closing of the Clubhouse for a 230 person event at \$25 per person. A typical Thursday revenue is about \$1500. A Profit and Loss Sheet will be distributed after the event. Staff will make efforts to keep as much of the Clubhouse open during future outside events. This is not something that will happen all the time.

Resident: The last e-mail that went out explaining why the Clubhouse would be closed was very important and residents were less concerned once they understood. Prior e-mails did not give full explanation.

Answer: Duly noted and we will keep everyone informed in future.

John Burns, Turf Department Superintendent

The Golf Course will be closed on May 9th and 10th for aerification and fertilization. We have had contact with the new management company several times and are looking forward to working together. With the good weather many plants are making a comeback, and it should be a quick transition this year.

Herb Hurley, Golf Pro

The summer reciprocal program has begun with 8 courses signed up this year. The Lady Bug Tournament is May 1st with 116 golfers. Yesterday was the Shriners Event with 122 golfers.

Bill Crusselle, General Manager

The bids are out on Phase III of the Landscaping Project and due back Friday. We are scheduled to review the bids on May 1st and will be moving forward with the renovation in front of the Clubhouse.

The survey for the new Woodshop is done and then going to the engineer and contractor, and then the County for permitting. It will be located to the right of the RV storage area, outside of the fence.

(Topic requested by resident.) Regarding the kitchen inspection that took place last January, two pieces of equipment were replaced, a broken lightbulb was replaced, and additional minor things such as a dented can of pasta was tossed. The Chef has a regular schedule for his staff for cleaning and inspections.

Gary Wind, Facilities Director

We had a demo on a new Elliptical machine with a front drive. The residents were in favor and it has been purchased. We will keep the old free motion unit which many residents like as well.

The exterior of the Clubhouse will be painted at the end of May or early June with a minor change in the color. Bill added that when exiting the front of the Clubhouse, on the left side behind

the half wall shielding the AC units, you will see three paint samples on the wall. The top color will be on the upper level of the Clubhouse, the second color will be on the lower level of the Clubhouse, and the third color will be the trim.

Marcia Merle, HOA Manager

During the spring break season we had issues with members wanting their guests to charge on their member accounts. To keep things organized, we ask that the members who will not be accompanying their guests to the Clubhouse/Pool/Pro Shop to register their guests at the Front Desk. The guest(s) will be issued a temporary guest pass with the option of checking whether the member wants to authorize their guest(s) to charge on their account, or pay cash.

Mike Russell, Food and Beverage Manager

The Food and Beverage budget numbers are holding steady. April's budget is on track and we hope to continue this onto the summer months and into the fall. Bill added that both Food and Beverage and Golf have exceeded their budget goals.

Answers to General Questions

- Closing of the Driving Range during Spring Break was done as a result of the construction of the building. The County held up the Driving Range project with planning and once approved the contractor was ready to mobilize. Due to insurance liability the Driving Range had to be closed during certain phases of the project.
- There are many broken and possibly dangerous Verizon covers in residents' yards. Staff will send out an e-bulletin with information on who to call to report broken covers.
- Outside vendors may deliver food to residents' homes which may then be brought to events at the Pavilion. The same applies to pot-lucks.
- There is no charge for use of the Pavilion.
- The Turf Department is responsible for weeding the easement along the perimeter fence.
- The Pine Grove Village entrance sign area has very tall weeds, bushes are planted behind the sign, and it is in need of maintenance. This area was erroneously missed during the last sign maintenance cycle and will be addressed.

- Pasco Transit is available to qualified residents of Heritage Pines.
- Staff will look at providing better signage pointing to the cart path down to the Driving Range.
- A resident heard that the new management company was not aware of all of the areas they will be responsible for. This is not true. This is a rumor.

STREET LIGHTING PROJECT

The Street Lighting continues to move forward. Today, the directional boring contractor was onsite to install electrical cabling and conduit for the light poles previously placed at the corner of Water Lily and Grand Club (adjacent to the 14th Hole Tee Box). By the time this article is published, these lights should be functioning.

Additionally, the CDD has been in contact with various Villages to notify them of plans to install lights in the vicinity of these Villages. Since these lights could have an impact on residents, the CDD feels it is important to get the approval of all involved before it creates a nuisance situation. The goal of the CDD is to be a good neighbor, and provide security and safety through adequate lighting in areas deemed to be "dark areas."

As a follow up, originally the plans were for WREC to trench the areas where new lights would be installed; and then, at the expense of the CDD, HP Turf Maintenance would back fill these areas and re-sod the area. Estimated cost would be around \$17,000. This price may have been low because the price of St. Augustine sod has nearly doubled. Just an example, to repair and re-sod the area on Webster Grove would be around \$3,000, with the cost of sod a \$450 per pallet, rather than the original estimate of \$200 per pallet. However, thanks to Richard Lovett of WREC, offered to get an alternative with a "phenomenal" price using directional boring. The price presented was less than \$6,000 for all areas. Additionally, there would be little intrusion and unsightly repairs of the sod. Stay tune for updates as the project moves forward.

ARCHITECTURAL CONTROL COMMITTEE

The committee is receiving more ECR's for installation of SOLAR PANELS on resident's homes. Residents must let the supplier and installer know that solar and electric generating panels and solar heating elements

must only be installed on the rear and side sections of the roof prior to ACC approval (site visit is required). Refer to section 4.12 in the Architectural Control Policy Manual.

An ECR (Exterior Change Request) is required prior to any changes made on your property. Provide as much information as necessary for the committee to approve your request. The committee meets the first and third Tuesday of each month. If your ECR is approved, a green approval sheet will be available at the front desk the following day. You must pick up that approval and place it in a front window while a service is being performed. When the job is completed, sign that green form and return it to the front desk.

NOTE: The Architectural Control Committee will review this request. You will be notified within thirty (30) days of the receipt of a completed request. If construction/installation is not commenced within the time set by the ACC in the written approval (but in no event later than ninety (90) days after such approval) the approval shall be deemed rescinded. The resident must request an extension (within one year of approval) and receive new paperwork. Otherwise new paperwork must be submitted.

The homeowner, upon signing this application, understands that the Architectural Control Committee functions to act on behalf of the Board of Directors of Heritage Pines Community Association, Inc. on the acceptability of the appearance of changes to the exterior of buildings or land. There is no intention, expressed or implied, to approve or disapprove any apparatus, its function, contractor or subcontractor. The maintenance of operation or appearance of any installation is the homeowner's responsibility.

If it should be necessary for you or the contractor to run vehicles or equipment over common grounds to do work at your home or on your property, you must first obtain permission from the General Manager and Village Board (if applicable) before any work can begin. Any damage caused must be repaired at the homeowner's expense. Before any work on the property begins it is suggested that the homeowner informs the contractor, or people doing the work, that it is their responsibility to repair any damages done to common grounds by their equipment. Ultimately the homeowner will incurall expenses related to damages

Cooking Oil Recycling Effort (CORE)

Are you recycling your cooking oil and grease or pouring them down the drain? Heritage Pines participates in Pasco County's CORE program. Our cooking oil/grease collection site is next to the Green Fiber bins near the cart barn across from Clubhouse. Here's why you should recycle your cooking oil. Please, NO motor oil.

When cooking oils and grease are poured down the drain, they stick to the inside of sewer pipes and build up over time. This can cause blockages that back up sewage into your home or cause a sewer overflow onto neighborhood streets. Overflows are messy, expensive and a health hazard. Recycling cooking oils and grease helps decrease sewer blockages and reduces the County's pump station and sewer maintenance costs, saving your tax dollars.

Tips:

- Never pour cooking oils, fats or grease down the drain.
- Before washing pots and dishes, scrape grease and food waste into the trash.
- Minimize the use of garbage disposals a lot of small pieces can clog pipes.
- Use sink strainers and clean them often.







GOLF HANDICAP SYSTEM

"Two basic premises underlie the USGA Handicap System, namely that each player will try to make the best score at every hole in every round regardless of where the round is played, and that the player will post every acceptable round for peer review. The player and the player's Handicap Committee have joint responsibility for adhering to these premises."

It's that time of year when many of our members leave us to go North for the summer. We all wish you safe travels and have a great time whether you stay here or are off traveling.

We would like to remind you that while you are away if/when you are golfing you are to continue to post your scores to the GHIN system. If you belong to another club that utilizes the GHIN system, you can have the same GHIN number and your scores will automatically be posted to both courses.

When playing nine-holes, post the nine-hole score. Do NOT wait to have another nine-hole round to put with it. The GHIN system will keep track and post a COMBINED "C" score when the second nine is played, even if it's the same nine-holes.

You can post your scores using your cell phone or on-line. These methods are useful when playing courses other than your home course. As always, if you have any questions regarding handicaps or posting scores, do not hesitate to contact someone on the handicap committee or our golf pro, Herb.



WATER AEROBICS

Water, water everywhere! Working out in the water is one of the most therapeutic activities one can take part in. Water aerobics builds cardio, strength and resistance all while being easy on the joints and in a cool and relaxing atmosphere!

Here are the Top 10 Reasons to do Water Aerobics:

Increase muscle strength. Water is a flowing and constantly changing product of nature, and as such can be every unpredictable in its movements. Since water flows in multiple directions, the resistance in the pool can range from four to 42 times greater than air, ensuring the body's muscles get a rigid workout. In fact, a study conducted found that after 12 weeks of regular aquatic aerobic exercise, participants had made significant gains in strength, flexibility and agility.

Build endurance. Unlike traditional weights, which require the human body to push and pull against the weight plus gravity, water resistance is a more natural resistance which requires the body to strain through the water rather than against it.

Increases flexibility. As the body is subject to water resistance during water aerobic exercise – which requires movement in various directions while adjusting to the push and pull of water – the joints naturally increase their range of motion. A study conducted found a significant increase in flexibility after subjecting a group of older adults to aerobic therapy exercise.

Low-impact exercise. We may not often think of it, but the traditional impact we place on our joints during a "land workout" can be taxing. In water aerobics, the buoyancy of the water helps takes off some of the impact we tend to place on our body, due to our own water weight. In layman's terms, our body's is not subject to gravity in the water, therefore the impact our joints take on when, say, running in water, is not equal to the impact when running on land. This is particularly appealing to those with joint conditions such as arthritis or those currently undergoing physical rehabilitation.

Alleviates pressure on the joints. Studies have shown water-based exercises such as water aerobics relieve pressure placed on joints from normal wear-and-tear and arthritis. In fact, hydrotherapy is shown to be the leading form of therapy for those suffering from joint problems.

Relieves stress and decreases anxiety. Watching bodies of water in motion can be one of the most soothing activities one can take part in to help relieve stress, which is why vacations to beaches and island paradises are so popular getaways. But being in the water can be just as relaxing! A study conducted found that aquatic exercise significantly decreased anxiety and negative mood states especially in women.

Burns calories. The combination of strength and cardio workouts mixed with water resistance in aquatic exercise ensures the body is getting a full workout. Depending on cardio activity, weight (including additional weights such as dumbbells and weight belts), water temperature, volume and buoyancy, the body can burn between 400 to 500 calories in an hour of exercise.

Reduces blood pressure. Water resistance is not just a buoyancy feature to help work the muscles. In fact, the water

pressure actually works with your blood as well and enables one's blood flow to circulate more effectively throughout the body, effectively decreasing blood pressure and, in the long run, decreasing resting heart rate. This benefit means your heart is maintaining its productivity while putting less stress on your heart!

Cooling exercise. As temperatures get warmer and the summer heat draws near, the desire to exercise in the burning sun may suddenly not seem so appealing, and so naturally dipping into any body of water becomes alluring. Water aerobics can satisfy that need to feel cool in warmer temperatures while still enabling a person to exercise. It's cool, crisp and refreshing, especially knowing you aren't struggling in the heat!

Popular activity. Water aerobics is not limited to any age group or skill level. As a result, water aerobics is known to a be one of the most popular bonding activities for friends and family. This is a wonderful way to make some new friends and meet your fellow neighbors. The sport appeals to all ages – with younger generations naturally enjoying the fun to be had in swimming pools while still appealing to the older generations and their need to maintain a moderate level of physical fitness.

Water Aerobics tips to know:

- o Always wear water shoes for added cushioning, shock absorption and comfort. Nerve endings are very close to the soles of your feet and constant jumping without shoes may cause nerve damage.
- o Stay hydrated. Though the water cools the body, you will still perspire especially during the summer months. I always suggest you drinking water before, during and after class. If during class you feel thirsty you are already dehydrated. Rehydration will prevent you from overheating, muscle cramping and heat stroke.

TREES OF HERITAGE PINES

You see trees every day. But have you ever thought about the benefits of trees? Trees are a very valuable part of landscapes.

- Trees improve air quality by removing particulates and air pollution.
- The shade they cast on buildings can lower summer temperatures and reduce energy costs.
- They increase property values.
- They can help reduce pollution and flooding by taking up water with their roots—water that would otherwise have flowed off the landscape and created storm water runoff.
- Well-chosen and -maintained trees can also help protect your home from hurricane-force winds.

According to the American Forestry Association, each year a single tree in the landscape provides \$73 worth of air conditioning savings, \$75 worth of erosion control, \$75 worth of wildlife shelter, and \$50 worth of air pollution reduction. If the resulting annual total of \$273 is compounded for 50 years at 5 percent interest, it results in a tree value of \$57,151. Therefore, the overall benefits of having trees in the landscape outweigh the initial price and maintenance cost of each tree. (from the University of Florida, http://gardeningsolutions.ifas.ufl.edu/plants/trees-and-shrubs/trees/)

Did you know that in the past 100 years, people have tried to make this location a citrus farm, and more recently a lumber plantation? This area is designated as the "Sandhills of Central Florida", zone 9A which means we can expect occasional winter temperatures of 20-25 degrees. Anyone who has put a shovel into the ground understands that description. In 2006, when the developer completed pushing dirt around and pouring cement, and many of us were moved in and looked around where we found the area now known as Heritage Pines was lacking trees in the common ground areas. The County required replacement of trees for the trees destroyed by the developer, and a committee of concerned owners worked to achieve an agreement with the developer to replant appropriate trees in common ground areas including on the golf course and along both sides of Grand Club Drive. The site plan was administered by H.P.'s original Environmental Stewardship Committee. The variety of native tree species planted along Grand Club Drive include: Southern Magnolias, Winged Elm, Florida Maple, Palatka Holly, Sweet Gum, Bald Cypress and Redbud. The variety ensures that any diseases that may target one species, doesn't destroy everything on the grounds. Now, as then, volunteers continue to contribute to a sustainable natural environment in our community.

In the residential neighborhoods our community hasn't been as successful. There is a significant reduction in our Heritage Pines tree canopy with removal of oaks because of insufficient replacements. Trees benefit all of us with shade and other continue to next page

environmental benefits. Drive through Timber Oaks sometime and you will notice a beautiful shade canopy of mature oaks. The H.P. Architectural Manual (and Pasco Ordinance) requires a minimum of two trees per lot. A permitting process is required for removal. According to Pasco Ordinance Chapter 800, Section 802 (Tree Preservation and Replacement), before a tree is removed home owners should have a Licensed Arborist or Certified Landscape Architect provide written verification that a tree is causing damage and that mitigation efforts such as pruning roots are not appropriate therefore the tree should be removed.

Use the Pasco County "recommended tree list", which is reprinted in this newsletter or you can find it at http://www.pascocountyfl.net/DocumentCenter/View/14188. Use the principle of right-plant, right place to determine a replacement tree appropriate to the location. Again, referencing the H.P. Architectural Manual, no fruit trees of any kind are approved for Heritage Pines residential property.

Except for the Sabal Palm (Florida State Tree), Washington and Date Palms (non-native), palms are not recommended as shade canopy trees. You can find the attributes/characteristics of various trees.....for our zone, mature width and height, wildlife value, shade, etc....at sources such as www.fnps.org (which is a native plant index); or http://lyra.ifas.ufl.edu/FloridaTrees/index.html (which is trees for urban and sunburn sites); or http://www.floridayards.org/fyplants/index.php (which is Florida friendly plant descriptions).

Florida Arbor Day was in January. National Arbor Day was April 27th. Plant a tree or contribute to planting a tree in our National Forests at https://shop.arborday.org/membershipstrees-to-forest.aspx.

ASK THE TECHIE

Q: I recently replaced my computer with one running Windows 10. The Window 10
Start Screen has a program name STORE that offers many programs both free and for purchase. Is this a safe place to get software?

A: The **Windows 10 STORE** is definitely a place you should utilize. It is very similar to the **Apple iTunes** and **Android Play Store** as a source for compatible **Windows 8** programs or APPS. It is a great place to find useful utilities, fun games, and other programs.

In the **STORE** you will find many 3rd party vendor specific product apps such as **Netflix**, **ESPN**, **eBay**, etc. As with their Apple and Android equivalents there are hundreds of thousands of apps available.

As to the safety of programs available at the **Windows 10 STORE**, I advise a "buyer beware" approach. I suggest checking the number of downloads and the user reviews. I recommend not being one of the first to download a new APP and to read the user reviews for functional and other useful information. The user comments usually advise if a "free" program is truly free or just a trial version that requires a

purchase later. The free apps (usually games) may include an advertisement whenever the game is started or during play. They sometimes offer an option to continue playing after the easier levels are mastered via a single or subscription purchase. Other freebies offer a purchase option for advanced features. Since purchases are handled via the **STORE**, using your credit card should be considered as safe as any online purchase from a known vendor.

The **Windows 10 STORE** should not to be confused with the **WINDOWS UPDATE** function. The **WINDOWS UPDATE** function is identical to the update capability contained in prior Windows versions. The **Windows 10 STORE** doesn't include updates for the built in **Windows 10** core functions such as **Internet Explorer, Control Panel,** etc.

Q: I am considering replacing my DVD player with a Blu-ray player to connect to my new HD TV. However, I have an extensive collection of DVD movies and don't want to have to repurchase. Will a new Blu-Ray player be able to play my old movies?

A: Yes, you should not have any problems playing commercially purchased DVD movies or CD music on your new Blu-ray player. In fact, you may notice that the picture quality of your DVD movies is improved when playing them on your new player. The Blu-ray player does an up-conversion of the DVD video that will appear somewhat crisper when viewed on a HD TV.

When connecting your Blu-ray player to a HD TV or home theater receiver, I recommend using HDMI or component cables. The single RCA cable will not provide a true HD quality picture. If you are connecting to a surround sound system use a HDMI or optical cable for optimum quality audio.



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
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FIRST ANNUAL PIE CONTEST AT PINE MEADOW VILLAGE PICNIC

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HUMMINGBIRDS OF HERITAGE PINES

As warmer weather approaches, multitudes of migrant birds are on track for arrival in North America. Among them are those favorite avian gems, hummingbirds.

The spring arrival—or year-round presence—of hummingbirds in yards varies across the country, but current studies point out some new potential challenges to migrating hummingbirds, such as changing bloom times of nectar plants and an earlier arrival of spring on their wintering and breeding grounds. AUDUBON provides general guidelines to current hummingbird migration patterns for various sections of the country, as well some tips on the different feeding strategies you can use to attract them to your yard.

Over most of the eastern two-thirds of North America, from central Canada southward, the Ruby-throated Hummingbird reigns supreme. Predominantly a neotropical migrant, it winters from southern Mexico to Costa Rica. Each spring, this species arrives in numbers along the Gulf Coast by early March, filtering northward over the next two months until arriving in northern states and southern provinces by late April or early May. Climate change is affecting the migration of Ruby-throats, though. As conditions warm on the wintering grounds, data indicate that they leave their winter homes earlier on their way to the Gulf Coast. Interestingly, it also appears that hummingbirds then hang around in the Gulf Coast for longer than normal, perhaps to recuperate from their trip across the Gulf of Mexico.

The Southeastern coast, from Cape Hatteras southward, in Florida, and especially around the Gulf Coast, is different from the rest of the eastern United States. Here hummingbirds are likely to be present year-round, with



both higher diversity and greater numbers of birds present in winter! As such, supplying nectar sources and insect-laded gardens is appropriate year-round in these regions.

Growing plants that are indigenous to your area is a great way to both attract and

help the hummingbirds you love. Native plants provide shelter and food, including a healthy environment for insects, part of the hummingbird diet important during breeding season. Get a list of native plants customized for your area by visiting www.audubon.org for its handy Plants for Birds database. A few that we have great success with in Heritage Pines are Florida Sage....bright red tubular flowers. It's a native wildflower. Blooms all year around. Not cold tolerant, but if cold-burned---or leggy, just cut them back to the ground, and they just start growing and blooming again. They will self-seed easily. You can see them at the Paleo Park sign, or in my yard. Love the sun, and any kind of water, except standing Another is Firebush, or commonly called "Hamelia". There is a dwarf variety, unless you have room for it to grow/spread, which could be 8 foot wide. This plant loves dry sunny places. If you have room for a vine, then Coral Honeysuckle is ideal and another Hummingbird favorite.

You can also become a Community Scientist. You can protect hummingbirds by helping crowdsource invaluable data using Audubon's free Hummingbirds at Home app or website. You just submit your observations on when hummingbirds feed on nectar-bearing plants in your yard or community. To get started, go to www.hummingbirdsathome.org.

relative to their body length, and they are also the only true hoverers in the avian class. To enable this special form of flight, hummingbirds have evolved several distinct adaptations, from a specialized wing shape to breast muscles that take up about 30 percent of their entire body weight (most birds' breasts weigh in at around 15-18 percent). Scientists have always suspected that this complex movement requires a more complex brain, but hummingbird brains are very small and hard to study. So much so that only recently did a team of Canadian scientists manage to crack how hummingbird brains handle hovering. Their research, published in this month's edition of Current Biology, shows that hummers have brains unlike any other bird (or four-limbed vertebrate, for that matter), which let them manage multi-directional flight.

To understand these differences, it's first important to consider how and why we move. Every creature on Earth is either predator or prey, and many are both depending on where they fall in the food chain. For almost all animals, this means moving forward—i.e., whichever way they are facing—either toward food or away from becoming food. Humans are a rare exception among vertebrates in that we have the capability to move relatively efficiently in many directions. (Have you ever seen a dog try to trot backwards or climb a ladder?) Despite this difference, our first instinct when faced with danger is still to turn around and run away from the threat, not waltz sideways to safety. This instinct can be traced to the way our brains perceive motion. The visual centers in the brains of all studied fourlimbed creatures respond most strongly to motion on the backto-front axis (think of us chasing something or something chasing us). Except for hummingbirds, according to the new research. Hummingbirds spend a lot of their time hovering, which means they have more to consider than just the front back-to-front axis. When hovering, a gust of wind might push them from the side. Or a predator might strike from below. So they have to be able to move not just in the forward direction to feed on a dangling flower, but in all directions. Because of this, it would make sense that hummingbirds' brains don't put the same emphasis on back-to-front movement that ours do—and that's exactly what the scientists found.

The research team discovered that in an area of the brain called the lentiformis mesencephali, which is the part that responds to visual stimuli, hummingbirds didn't have a strong back-to-front preference like all other animals tested thus far. Instead, they seemed to have no preference, responding to motion in every direction equally. The researchers also found that hummingbird brains are tuned to respond more strongly to fast movements than slow ones. This was a surprise because scientists had assumed that their brains would be tuned for a low-speed hover. But if you think about it, being optimized for high speed makes sense, too. An Anna's Hummingbird can move at 385 body lengths per second during mating flights, which is screaming fast (in comparison, an F15 Eagle fighter jet has a top speed of Mach 2.5, which translates to around 45 body lengths per second). At that speed, the ability to make nearinstantaneous course corrections is the difference between life and death — or mating and not mating, which is basically the

same thing in evolutionary terms. That hummingbird brains perceive the world differently than other vertebrates is a fascinating ornithological find, but the researchers have other motivations for their study—understanding flight in nature to design better robots. The discovery of an animal brain that can move efficiently in three dimensions could be very valuable for artificial intelligence in flying drones, for instance, or computerized autopilot systems for helicopters. But potential commercial applications aside, isn't it interesting to think that the tiniest bird brains might also be the most complicated?







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
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
