



FROM THE GENERAL MANAGER

Our summer this year has been a bit different than any in recent memory with the climate changes creating more thunderstorms with excessive rain along with unusual amounts of thunder and

lightning. Although the weather has impacted our rounds of golf, the natural and clean water has been really good for our golf course and common grounds. DTE has done an outstanding job in a short amount of time improving the golf course and assessing what needs to be done for both short term and long term success. The long range plan that was agreed upon and sent out to all residents should provide Heritage Pines with a golf course that our golfing residents will be proud of and one that will keep our property values increasing and the length of time a home that is for sale is on the market decreasing. The improvement of the common grounds and the new landscape projects done over the past three years have also been a factor in creating a greater sense of pride in our community.

We are in that time of the year when we know that it is not if, but when, we will have to deal with tropical storms and hurricanes. We were very fortunate last year to have had minimal damage from Hurricane Irma and everyone should have taken from that experience what should and should not be done when the chance of a storm coming our way occurs. Start the process now of determining what you will need to have and what you will need to do if necessary.

GOLF COURSE AND COMMON GROUNDS MAINTENANCE NEWS

different. We have been drier than we were last month, but we've had about a two week stretch of cloudy weather and periodic rains that has slowed down our progress. This is what we call, "The Dog Days of Summer!"

We have just completed our second core aerificiation for the summer and everything went really well. We were able to vertical mow all of the short grass, i.e. tees, approaches, fairways, and greens. We back tracked and verticut the greens which means that we went down and back on the same pass to help eliminate the grain on the greens surface. Once completed, we covered the greens in topdressing sand and used a drag mat to try to get the sand to fill the holes as best as possible. We then used a 1-ton double, drum roller to roll the greens and remove any ruts that may have been caused during this process. We will be dragging and rolling the greens over the next few days but will try to do so with as little interference with play as possible. We were able to borrow a set of verticutting reels from another DTE course and used them to verticut the fairways on the front nine. The Weidenman is the large vacuum looking machine that we used to verticut the back nine fairways. This machine is very rigid, so you cannot verticut as aggressively with this machine, but it cleans up behind itself which helps out a lot. We plan to continue to utilize this machine throughout the course of the year to help level high areas in fairways and give you a smoother playing surface. We created a lot of debris while verticutting, so we are still working on getting things cleaned up. We moved all tees, approaches, and fairways after we verticut but will need to mow them again to get a clean cut and remove any excess that was not cut during the first mow.

We are working on getting all the Viburnum hedges trimmed throughout the property. We have to spend a lot of time removing the vines prior to trimming. Once we finish an area, we are applying a growth regulator that will keep the hedge from growing so rapidly. Unfortunately, we haven't found anything that we can spray on the hedge to kill the vines that will not hurt the Viburnum, but we are going to continue to try to find better methods to become more efficient. Our current Common Area schedule is not leaving much time for the detail work that needs to be completed, so we are going to adjust that schedule to allow for some time to get this work completed. We continue to remove dead pine trees throughout the property and it seems like every time we turn around we see another tree that is starting to decline. We are hoping that the Southern Pine Beetle will run its course and move on to another property, but until then, we will try to get these dead trees removed as quickly as possible.

Our next course closure is scheduled for September 13th and we plan to aerify the greens again, but we will not be pulling cores this time. We will use a solid tine to open holes that will allow oxygen and moisture to get to the root zone. We also plan to fertilize tees and fairways again to give them some extra food in preparation for overseeding.

The summer months are always the toughest months. We have to complete cultural practices during this time because the turf is growing vigorously, but so is everything else. We have been trying to keep up with the bed weeds and trimming as best as possible while getting these things completed. We are going to focus on getting the Green Mile and the rest of the Viburnum trimmed in the common areas and treating the weeds in the turf on the golf course. I hope everyone is happy with the progress that we are making and look forward to hearing your feedback.

have changed as well. Please check with your village manager if you have any questions on that amount. You do not have to do anything to change monthly automatic debit amount if you are set up for ACH. It will be processed at the new amount.

ACH and Online/Email Services

If you are not set up for automatic debit (ACH), please consider this simple process. It's easy to set up and you don't have to worry about anything except deducting the amount from your checking balance each month. And in case you did not know, we never deduct your HOA fee before the third each month. We had many requests to hold off until the third from members that don't receive their direct deposits until then. Also please consider doing away with paper statements. You can view online or have emailed. Just request an "Opt out of paper statement form" from the office, fill out and return with your email address.

Out of Town Mail Service

Recently it was brought to our attention that some mail does not

get forwarded if the name on your account is something different, like a trust for example. If you are going out of town for an extended period of time, please let us know in the office. We can set your mail to go to another address so you don't miss important association mailings. Just remember to give us a call or email to change it back when you return home.

Member Charge (Jonas) System

We always ask that you bring your member charge card to the club for purchases. This just helps prevent charge errors. If you do not have your card, please do not sign your charge until you have verified it has correct member information at the top. Also as mentioned before, our Jonas system separates your HOA fees and club charges, so we need to have them paid separately. We appreciate that most monthly accounts are current and if not it is usually a one time over sight and we take that into consideration. Please keep in mind club charges not paid by the 20th of following month can be assessed a \$25 late fee as well as HOA fees not paid in the month they are due.





Your signature below acknowledges you have reviewed the Architectural Control Policy Manual and grants permission for the Heritage Pines Community Association Architectural Control Committee to enter onto the owner's property to review the application and to inspect the proposed project site before the work begins. Any work done on the proposed project prior to written or conditional approval of the ACC is a violation of the HPCA Restrictive Covenants and may have to be removed at the property owner's expense.

NOTE: The Architectural Control Committee will review this request. You will be notified within thirty (30) days of the receipt of a completed request. If construction/installation is not commenced within the time set by the ACC in the written approval (but in no event later than ninety (90) days after such approval) the approval shall be deemed rescinded. The resident must request an extension (within one year of approval) and receive new paperwork. Otherwise new paperwork must be submitted.

The homeowner, upon signing this application, understands that the Architectural Control Committee functions to act on behalf of the Board of Directors of Heritage Pines Community Association, Inc. on the acceptability of the appearance of changes to the exterior of buildings or land. There is no intention, expressed or implied, to approve or disapprove any apparatus, its function, contractor or subcontractor. The maintenance of operation or appearance of any installation is the homeowner's responsibility.

If it should be necessary for you or the contractor to run vehicles or equipment over common grounds to do work at your home or on your property, you must first obtain permission from the General Manager and Village Board (if applicable) before any work can begin. Any damage caused must be repaired at the homeowner's expense. Before any work on the property begins it is suggested that the homeowner informs the contractor, or people doing the work, that it is their responsibility to repair any damages done to common grounds by their equipment. Ultimately the homeowner will incur all expenses related to damages

PAPER RECYCLING UPDATE FOR HERITAGE PINES

At the time of this newsletter, or in the very near future, you will notice that the Green Fiber paper/cardboard recycle bins have been removed.

Green Fiber was recently bought out by another company. This has resulted in two problems for Heritage Pines. One, the new company will no longer reimburse us for recycled paper and cardboard. Two, they have a monthly pickup charge. Neither of these are positive changes for our program.

The plus for Heritage Pine residents is we currently have curb pickup twice a month for recyclables that includes paper and cardboard. Please flatten all boxes to fit into your container. For multiple pieces, please flatten corrugated boxes, bundle and tie. We continue to encourage recycling by all our residents. There is only one planet. It's the right thing to do.

Below is a more detailed list of **All Items Approved For Curbside Recycling By Pasco County:**

- Metal Food Cans (examples are: soup, vegetables, etc.)
- Glass: Clear, Green, And Brown Glass Bottles And Jars. Clean before putting in recycle can. Remove all bottle caps and throw in the trash.
- Acceptable Plastic Containers: Plastic containers that are numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 7. Look for the triangle at the bottom of the container which has the number. (Examples are: soda bottles, plastic milk containers, laundry detergent, etc.). Remove all caps and throw away (they are too small for the machines that separate the containers at Pasco Recycling).
- All Types Of Paper (not collected by Heritage Pines any longer): scrap paper, paper bags, phonebooks, magazines, junk mail, office paper, flyers, cardboard (corrugated boxes, shoe boxes, cereal boxes, etc.) – please flatten all boxes to fit into your container. For multiple flattened corrugated boxes, please bundle and tie. You can put large amounts next to your recycling container.

Acceptable Containers That Can Be Used For Curbside Recycling are any common refuse can, a blue recycle bin, or any reusable container large enough to hold <u>all</u> of your recycling. <u>Pasco County stopped collecting recycling in plastic bags as of October 1, 2015.</u>

Place your recycle container at the curb on recycling pick-up days, which is currently the second and fourth Wednesday of each month.

Items Collected in Or Next to the Cart Barn in the Parking Lot

- **Aluminum Cans**: Rinse them out and put them into the <u>green trailer</u> which is in the parking lot, near the golf cart barn. We are paid by the pound for all aluminum cans towards environment projects.
- Household Batteries, Fluorescent Bulbs and Tubes:

bring them inside the golf cart barn, right side overhead door opening. There are containers there for fluorescent tubes, fluorescent light bulbs, and one for household batteries

 Cooking Oil: Use the green container marked "Cooking Oil" located at the fenced storage area in the parking lot. Pour the liquid oil into the perforated top section of the container, dispose the bottle that contained the oil into your normal garbage receptacle.

We currently have no system in place for recycling styrofoam, plastic bags, toys, plastic tablecloths, or picnic items made of plastic. However, Publix has a container in front of the store for Styrofoam egg cartons and clean styrofoam meat trays and another container for plastic bags.

THE PASCO COUNTY RECYCLING CENTER on Hays Rd., WILL ACCEPT THE FOLLOWING HAZARDOUS ITEMS: Metal, toxic and hazardous materials, televisions and other electronics of all types (some at a small charge), motor oil, auto batteries, paint, and household cleaners. Call the center located at 14230 Hays Rd., Spring Hill for more details at (727) 847-8041. Or wait for the next Heritage Pines Hazardous Waste Collection Day in the spring 2019.

HERITAGE PINES GOLF HANDICAP COMMITTEE

By Joy Stefany, Handicap Chair

"Two basic premises underlie the USGA Handicap System, namely that each player will try to make the best score at every hole in every round, regardless of where the round is played, and that the player will post every acceptable round for peer review. The player and the player's Handicap Committee have joint responsibility for adhering to these premises"

That being said, I want to remind players to POST all eligible scores! It is the Players' responsibility to POST all acceptable scores, whether you play at Heritage Pines or any other course. Please remember that ALL of the tees at Heritage Pines are rated for both Ladies and Men.

- If you play quota points and pick up after not making a point, record your most likely score – not to exceed your ESC.
- If you have an 18-hole handicap and play nine holes, record the nine-hole score. Let the GHIN system keep track of the nine-hole scores and combine to make an 18-hole

- score. It does NOT matter if it's two on the front, two on the back or one front and one back. This is true if you play either the front or back twice in one day.
- If you have a nine-hole handicap and play 18 holes, record the front and back separately.
- If 13 or more holes are played, an 18-hole round MUST be posted. Record par plus any handicap strokes that you are entitled to receive on the holes not played.
- If 7-12 holes have been played, post a nine-hole score. If seven or eight holes are played, record par plus any strokes for the holes not played. You must play at least seven holes on the front or back in order to post a nine-hole score.

The annual Village Golf Tournament is coming up. This is always a fun event where the villages compete in a net game. We not only verify that the participants have a USGA approved handicap but that the handicap is current. That means that you MUST post all eligible scores. In the past, it was determined that some of the players were required to play 'scratch' as the GHIN handicap was inactive, players were posting erroneous information to the scoring record or not posting scores. This puts the golfer and the player's team at a disadvantage when an accurate handicap is not available.

- 1) Your opponents see that you are "defending" your side of the court, but fail to follow the ball and your partner when they have to go wide to return a ball. You and your partner should feel as though you are attached by a rope that keeps you about 12 feet apart. If you both take a step and reach, you will be able to cover the distance between you. If your opponent goes for the open court, it is a lower percentage shot.
- 2) The net is lower in the middle. The net is only 36 inches at the middle and 42 inches in the doubles alley, six inches higher.
- 3) Down the middle gives the ball striker more court to work with than trying to hit "short angles".
- 4) Confusion. That's right! Don't tell me the ball has never continue to next page

The minimum amount of space recommended for a court is 30 by 60 feet, or four pickleball courts per one standard tennis court.

ASK THE TECHIE

Q: I am planning on replacing my printer. My current printer is connected to my laptop via a USB cable. Can I get a printer

that would allow me to print while in another room? I also want to be able to print from my iPad. Is that possible?

A: Since you already are setup for wireless WIFI, you can configure a printer to print from anywhere in your home. However, you must purchase a printer that supports this type connection. All printers include a USB connection which requires your computer to be physically connected to it with a cable in order to print. Some very reasonable priced printers also include the capability to print via a home network (wireless or Ethernet).

Assuming that you will be placing the printer in close proximity to your Internet modem or router, I'd recommend an Ethernet connection. This is the simplest to setup but requires the purchase of an Ethernet cable for about \$10. If the printer you purchase doesn't include an Ethernet connection or if it is not in the same area as your Internet modem, then wireless is your only choice. You will need the same security key used when your laptop or iPad was originally setup for wireless.

The software CD included with the printer will take you through the steps to get your printer setup on your network. If you have more than one computer, each can be setup to print to your new printer. Some new printers now offer web printing to allow printing from smartphones and tablets. If you are using this feature your printer **must** be connected to your home network with either an Ethernet cable or wirelessly.

Q: I received a form letter from Spectrum informing me that they were switching to an all-digital system. The letter also says that all TV's had to connect to a Set Top Box to receive TV channels. I have three TV's in my home with only one Box. Is this letter real and what do I need to do to continue to receive TV service on my TV's?

A: Yes, the letter is definitely real. If the Spectrum schedule holds, by now any TV's not connected to a Spectrum provided box will no longer be able to receive TV.

If you have a TV that is connected directly to the wall with a Coax cable you will need to contact Spectrum and have them send you one of their digital set top boxes. Their offer is to provide a single box at no charge for 12 months after which they will charge a monthly fee. This fee is currently \$5.99. If you require more than one box, the additional charge will be effective immediately. The package you receive from Spectrum includes cables and a new remote that will control the new Set Top Box. The remote can be programmed to turn your TV ON/OFF and control the volume. After this is done, you won't need to use the TV remote that came with your TV.

Note that the digital box Spectrum provides offers only a HDMI connection. If you have an older TV that doesn't have the HDMI port, you won't be able to watch TV on this TV. If this is your situation you should ask Spectrum if they offer alternative equipment for TV's without an HDMI connection.

IT'S ALL ABOUT THE JEANS...... NO, THE OTHER GENES!



West Pasco County GENEALOGY Society (WPCGS) has moved to a new home close to Heritage Pines: The next meeting will be held on Wednesday, September 19, 2018.

The West Pasco County Genealogy Society (WPCGS) was founded in 1983 as a non-profit educational organization of amateur and professional family historians, genealogists and archivists. The Society strives to encourage the research, publication, and preservation of genealogical and historical material; to instruct and lend assistance to the membership and the public in modern methods of ancestry and DNA research. These objectives are accomplished through regular meetings and Society-sponsored workshops, lectures, field trips, socials and other educational activities. The Society offers many opportunities for the public to attend seminars and classes in genealogy-related subjects. There is something for everyone at Society meetings from the novice to the more experienced genealogist. The cost of membership in the Society is \$15.00 annually. Each meeting/seminar is \$5 for members; \$7 for nonmembers. WPCGS meets from 12:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. every third Wednesday of the month at The CARES Rao Musunuru, M.D. Enrichment Center at 12417 Clock Tower Parkway. Hudson, FL, located within the Beacon Woods section of Hudson, except during the summer months of June, July and August. Also, instead of a seminar or meeting in December, there typically is a Society Christmas party held for members.

The next meeting and seminar will be held on September 19, 2018 at 12:30 p.m. in the CARES Community Activity Room. The topic of discussion is "Emigration Paths." Debbe Hagner, WPCGS president, will present tips and guidelines on researching ancestral emigration from native countries and immigration into America. Focus will be on where one can find both emigration and immigration records.

The Family History Center

The Family History Center offers free research and help from a well versed Genealogist. The Family History Center was established to enable the general public to conduct extensive research on their family ancestry. No religious affiliation to the Mormon Church is required. The Center is open to everyone on the following days: Tuesday – 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Wednesday – 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., Thursday – 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Friday – 6 p.m. to 9 p.m., Saturday – 10 a.m. to noon. Note: hours sometimes change.

The Center is located at 10606 Hilltop Drive in New Port Richey, FL 34654. It is located within the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints' community and library rooms. From the intersection of Little Road and Hilltop Drive (called Embassy Drive on the west side of Little Road) drive east on Hilltop Drive for approximately two miles. The Church is located on the right side of Hilltop Drive. Enter through the main entrance to the building. Ring the doorbell, and an aide will open the door and escort you into the Center.

The Center provides free computer access to the largest genealogical database in the world, www.Familysearch.org,

which is maintained by the Church of Latter Day Saints in Salt Lake City, Utah. The public may use the Center's computers to perform ancestry research; can review on-line records of ancestral and historical documents such as birth, marriage and death certificates, census information; church baptismal, marriage and burial records; immigration and naturalization records; historical, military and governmental records, and much more.

Visitors may print out records on the Center's printers, and can create, input and maintain their own family history data in the database, and may utilize the Center's genealogical library of books and microfilm reels that are maintained on site. There are knowledgeable aides at the Center including certified genealogist Debbe Hagner, president of the WPCGS, who assist visitors with operating the computers and provide guidance in using the database. In addition to researching the Familysearch.org database, the Center also provides free access to many other genealogical databases, which normally require paid subscriptions, such as Ancestry.com; Myheritage.com; Find-a-Grave; Fold3.com; and numerous other ancestry record and document resources.

Debbe Hagner, certified genealogist, is generally at the Family History Center on Tuesday's 9 a.m. - 3 p.m., Wednesday 9 a.m. - 1 p.m.; Thursday 9 a.m. - 3 p.m.; Friday 6 p.m. - 9 p.m.; Saturday 10 a.m. - noon to assist you. Hours are subject to change. For confirmation of Debbe's hours TEXT 727-271-0770 or email debbehagner@yahoo.com.

WATER AEROBICS





WILDLIFE IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD

What is the difference between a tortoise and a turtle? Did you know the simple answer is land and water?

Other interesting differences are that tortoises are herbivores and have a life span of 80 to 150 years, while turtles are omnivores with a life span of 20-40 years. Both are reptiles from the order of Testudines, but in different classification families. Which means, the bodies of tortoises and turtles are both shielded by a shell, the upper part is called the carapace and the lower portion called a plastron. The carapace and plastron are attached by a bridge that allows the head and limbs to be withdrawn within the shell, but the whole body can never be totally detached from it. All are generally reclusive and shy in nature.

In this area of Florida you may see Gopher Tortoises, a long-lived reptile that occupies upland habitat including forests, pastures and yards. They are considered to

be a keystone species because they dig deep long burrows that they share with 350 other species of animals, providing shelter for all. In Florida, the Gopher Tortoise is listed as Threatened. Both the tortoise and its burrow are protected under state law. Currently they must be relocated before any land clearing or development takes place. This is a rather recent change. Previously, developers were allowed to bulldoze over burrows, burying the animals alive. Because of the tortoises slow metabolism, it took years for them to suffocate or starve after being buried below ground.

You will see Gopher Tortoise burrows in sandy soils. There are always two entrances, perhaps 30 feet apart and are elliptical in shape, not round.

We also have fresh water turtles at Heritage Pines. Florida has approved strong conservation measures for freshwater turtles. Collecting turtles from the wild is severely limited and controlled. Selling any turtle taken from the wild is prohibited.

There are three native species of softshell turtles in Florida: The Florida Softshell, the Gulf Coast Smooth Softshell Turtle and the Gulf Coast Spiny Softshell Turtle. The Florida softshell turtles are some of the largest fresh water turtles. They have

fleshy shells adapted for swimming, a long neck and an elongated head with a long snorkel-like nose. Take a look:

You may also see this guy or gal.....a Florida Box Turtle. Turtles are fascinating reptiles that have existed on Earth 220 million years. Florida has more turtle species than any other





state. Of the 26 species found here, the majority, at

18, are freshwater turtles. The others are gopher tortoises, box turtles and five sea turtle species. All turtles are air breathing species, but the aquatic turtles can hold their breath for extended periods of time. All lay eggs in holes they have dug on land

in dry ground. If aquatic species, when the baby turtles hatch, these hatchlings immediately return to the water. If a Gopher Tortoise, the hatchlings join the mother in her burrow.

A frequent question is what to do when you see a turtle crossing the road? A turtle rescue foundation says:

First, be safe. Busy streets are dangerous for rescuers and turtles alike. Put on your hazard lights and pull fully off the road. Make sure other drivers see you. When picking up a small turtle, grasp it on either side of its shell behind the front legs. The turtle may kick at you, but many will choose to stay safely "tucked in". Keep the turtle low to the ground when moving them. They have surprising strength, if it pushes free from your grip, you don't want it to fall and injure itself. Make sure you put the turtle down in the direction it was heading. NEVER TURN THEM AROUND! That turtle is on a mission. Never relocate a turtle...many have home ranges. Sit back and enjoy, and know you've done a good deed.


