



### Buver's Capital Contribution

The Heritage Pines Board of Directors approved a Buyer's Capital Contribution amendment to be added to the ballot in February. This Buyer's Capital Contribution will be \$1,500 which will be paid by all NEW residents who buy a home in Heritage Pines.

Vice President

These funds will be placed in our capital fund which will give us the ability to grow and acquire new assets. These funds will not be used for day-to-day operations. We have been selling approximately 80-100 homes in a year. If we sell 100 homes next year and have in place the Buyer's Capital Contribution fee we will have increased our income \$150,000 in a year. Over three years we will have accumulated \$450,000. This will certainly help us in achieving some of our future goals.

A good example of one of our current requirements is our need for space. The office staff is working in cramped quarters including hallways and storage areas. We are also always struggling to find space for our current activities like walk aerobics, tai chi, yoga, ping pong, line dancing, ballroom dancing, and more. With pickleball now being an up-and-coming sport, there is also a request for new courts to accommodate this activity and attract new buyers.

This capital contribution fund is not new. US Homes and Lennar charged the new homeowners a similar fee. With the transition to the Heritage Pines owners, we lost the right to charge this fee. Most recently our sister communities, Timber Pines and Heritage Springs have voted and passed to bring back their Buyer's Capital Contribution.

The benefit of passing this amendment, is that it provides an additional revenue source to ensure adequate funding to meet both short-term and longer-term capital needs. If not approved, required funds will continue to be paid exclusively by current Heritage Pines homeowners via monthly HOA fees.

It is important that we continue to keep up with the times and the changing interests of retirees. This Buyer's Capital Contribution will help to keep us vital and desirable in the marketplace.

### FROM THE GENERAL MANAGER

With the weather cooling this month and the activities increasing in the community, there will be much more activity throughout our community. The golf course is in much better condition this year

and this month the course will be overseeded. As a reminder, to do this the course will be closed from the sixth through the ninth of this month and when play resumes it will be cart path only until November 23rd. Other things that you will notice are the new tables and chairs on the tennis courts and the new carpet on the bocce ball courts. If you are using the pool or spa you will notice that we have increased the amount of lounge chairs around the pool and added more umbrellas. Also, a new amp and two new outdoor speakers were installed in the pool deck area and sound terrific. We hope that this month we will have finally got through the permitting process with Pasco County and that the construction work will begin on the new woodshop. Once this is done, the next step will be to finally make some moves with the locations of some of the office staff to provide more space.

Work continued last month around the front of the Clubhouse. Landscape lighting was installed by our facilities staff around the new palm trees in front of the Clubhouse. We also seal coated the driveway loop and handicapped parking area in front of the Clubhouse and all the parking space lines were redone.

### FROM THE ACCOUNTING DEPT.

### 2018 HOA Fees

The monthly assessment amount is \$185 per month for Heritage Pines Community Association. Many of the village assessments have changed as well. Please check with your village manager if you have any questions on that amount. You do not have to do anything to change monthly automatic debit amount if you are set up for ACH. It will be processed at the new amount.

#### **ACH and Online/Email Services**

If you are not set up for automatic debit (ACH), please consider this simple process. It's easy to set up and you don't have to worry about anything except deducting the amount from your checking balance each month. And in case you did not know, we never deduct your HOA fee before the third each month. We had many requests to hold off until the third from members that don't receive their direct deposits until then. Also please consider doing away with paper statements. You

can view online or have emailed. Just request an "Opt out of paper statement form" from the office, fill out and return with your email address.

#### **Out of Town Mail Service**

Recently it was brought to our attention that some mail does not get forwarded if the name on your account is something different, like a trust for example. If you are going out of town for an extended period of time, please let us know in the office. We can set your mail to go to another address so you don't miss important association mailings. Just remember to give us a call or email to change it back when you return home.

### Member Charge (Jonas) System

We always ask that you bring your member charge card to the club for purchases. This just helps prevent charge errors. If you do not have your card, please do not sign your charge until you have verified it has correct member information at the top. Also as mentioned before, our Jonas system separates your HOA fees and club charges, so we need to have them paid separately. We appreciate that most monthly accounts are current and if not it is usually a one time over sight and we take that into consideration. Please keep in mind club charges not paid by the 20th of following month can be assessed a \$25 late fee as well as HOA fees not paid in the month they are due.

### GOLF COURSE AND COMMON GROUNDS MAINTENANCE NEWS

We are starting to see a lot of changes that signify fall is coming starting with shorter days and some of the trees starting to drop their leaves. The night time temperatures have also started to drop which will start to slow down the growth of the turf and plant material, and hopefully the weeds.

We forfeited our closed day in October so we could have an extra day for over-seeding this month. So instead of verticutting or spiking the greens last month, we chose to utilize our brush attachment for a couple of days to stand up the turf prior to lightly topdressing. Standing up the turf canopy allows us to get a better cut, remove some of the excess material, and open up the canopy which helps move the sand into the soil profile faster. Frequent topdressing fills voids and creates a smoother ball and truer putts. It also helps to prevent scalping and dilute thatch build-ups which can cause localized dry spots or promote disease.

We had to stop treating for weeds in the areas that are going to be overseeded because certain herbicides can affect seed germination. We are going to continue treating the weeds in the rough areas and pine straw beds throughout the winter months and hope to have less weed pressure next year. We will also be applying a pre-emergent that we have had great success with at other properties while we are treating for weeds. The shorter days and cooler weather will also help reduce the growth rate and germination of certain weeds, but we will also start to see winter time weeds pop-up if we do not time our pre-emergent applications properly. Once we have the seed on the ground we

will have to be very careful about where we are driving to make sure that we are not collecting seed on our wheels and dropping it into areas that are not going to be overseeded. We will also have to be very careful when it comes to filling divots. We are going to premix divot sand with seed for filling divots on tees. fairways, and approaches but will also have sand without seed available to fill divots in the rough areas. I would like to ask that everyone is mindful of this so we do not have seed germinating in areas that it shouldn't be. We have continued to aerify and fertilize weak areas throughout the golf course. Most areas are along the cart path near the tees or greens that have become compacted due to heavy traffic. We are also trying to move our stakes and cart signs to reduce the amount of traffic in these areas and ask that you obey all traffic signs on the golf course. I have noticed the areas between the blue stake and the greens are getting worn from traffic as well so we are going to try to move those stakes more often. These things are hard to notice while the turf is actively growing, but once the turf goes dormant for the winter, these areas can become weak and bare quickly.

The efforts that we have put forth on controlling the weeds in the common area beds is starting to pay off. The areas that have been treated recently have less and less weeds coming back each month. We will continue these efforts throughout the winter months and hope that we have none to very little weed pressure next year. The common area crew has been completing detail in each section on a monthly rotation. They have been prepping the beds for our fall mulch application. We should have all of the mulch completed prior to Thanksgiving. With the shorter days and cooler temperatures, it is no longer necessary to mow the turf weekly. We will utilize the time that we would normally spend mowing to complete our mulch application and continue detailing areas that need it.

Between golf, common areas, and CDD, we have removed almost 200 dead pine trees in the last couple of months. When I spoke with the extension agent from the University of Florida, they said that they believe the Pine Beetle will slow down as the temperatures drop but cannot guarantee anything. We will continue to monitor the property for dead or dying trees and get them scheduled to be removed as quickly as possible.

We will be closed this month from the sixth through the ninth for overseeding. This will allow us to prep the course for seed, apply the seed, and have a day or two to water the course without interfering with play. The course will be cart path only until November 23rd and at that time will be opened back up to the 90 degree rule.

Thanks again for all the compliments about the property. The crew has been working hard to keep up with the Summer time needs and is looking forward to a change in weather.

### Michael Russell, F&B Manager

- A new menu will be out within the next couple of weeks.
- A few events are coming up which will bring in additional revenue.
- The restaurant will be open on Thursday night's beginning in October.
- Residents' favorite burgers will be added to the menu as specialty burgers.
- Will look into the possibility of getting specials out a couple of days in advance so that residents can plan ahead.
- Working with the Chef on adding small plates on new menu.

### Linda McCann, Board President

The Board is looking into adding to the February ballot a Buyer's Capital Contribution. This will only apply to new buyers in Heritage Pines. US Homes charged a fee for new homebuyers. An affirmative vote of 2/3 of the membership will be required in order for this to pass. Both Timber Pines and Heritage Springs have done this. We are looking at charging \$1,500 for new buyers in Heritage Pines, which will help build our Capital Funding. Regarding outsourcing the restaurant, this has been researched in the past. If the restaurant is outsourced, then we lose control in different areas of the operation.

#### Pat Liston, Board Vice President

The Buyer's Capital Contribution will allow each new homebuyer to pay into the amenities that we have been paying into for years. They are coming in and are able to use all of the amenities that we have been taking care of, which need to be renewed and rebuilt. It would help fund both long term and short term goals. One of those goals is more space. We lost our outside events and we were tracking quite a bit of money the year that we gave them up. Now it is taking us a long time to go out and bring events back. The McGladrey Report said we need streams of revenue. We do well with our budget but we need to be proactive and aggressive with our community so that we do not look old.

We have gone 4-5 years without an assessment increase even though prices go up every year.

Some are concerned about the fee being advertised on the real estate listings and discouraging buyers, but we all paid a buy-in fee to the builder when we first moved here. The Board members are residents too and share the residents' concerns.

#### Jouce Welsh, Board Director

We are hoping that the new homebuyers will be paying \$1,500 into the Capital Fund. If we sell 100 homes in a year, that will be \$150,000, and over a three year period it will be \$450,000. Things are outdated and we need to remodel, and we need space for new activities. We need to move into the future.

### Bill Crusselle, General Manager

Regarding the F&B budget, the budget forecast is currently \$20,000 short, but this does not include upcoming events, and we will end up exceeding our budget by year end.

Per the McGladrey Report the average annual operating expenses of similar clubs in our region per home are \$8,000,

and ours here at HP is \$3,500 per home. The average annual loss in F&B in this region is between \$700,000 and \$800,000 per Club. Heritage Springs has increased their monthly assessment every year for the past six years at a minimum of the cost of living increase. Heritage Springs is at \$205 and Timber Pines is a little over \$200, we are at \$185, so as things were going up they were keeping up with it, and we have not. We went up last year for insurance and reclaimed water.

Regarding the budget and expenses we are having to adjust to things such as our insurance which is increasing by 6% for next year. The infected trees could also turn into something much bigger than anticipated. Nearby communities are up to six digits for the cost of tree removal as a result of the pine beetles.

The Golf Course and Driving Range will be closed for overseeding November 6-9. It will be cart paths only for two weeks. Watch the Golf Daily e-mail for updates.

About 8-10 new golf packages have been sold this year, many of which have come from the golf clinics.

Gary Wind. Facilities Maintenance Director

Thank you to the community for the new facilities maintenance truck. It is much appreciated and much needed.

The Facilities Maintenance Department has had some staff changes. A couple of long time staff members have left us and new employee, Matt, started a couple of weeks ago with a strong background in maintenance.

The recycling containers have been removed. Residents can still recycle curbside. Recycling items are newspaper, cardboard, shredded paper in a paper bag, NOT in a plastic bag. No plastic bags are allowed. Please bundle as much as possible. The company that was taking the recycling before was losing money. Aluminum cans, lightbulbs, cooking oil, can all still be recycled. The Hazardous Waste Collection Day has not been set yet, but will be announced when it is scheduled. If the curbside service misses your home, call the Front Desk and tell them to contact Gary Wind to check on the status.

Our Architect is working hard to get the Woodshop permitting passed with the county. The permitting department keeps coming back with more and more questions.

Working on setting a quarterly schedule for fence-line maintenance, and a Common Ground schedule.

The Golf Course and Common Grounds is making progress and working on getting things in good shape prior to overseeding in November. Temps will begin to drop soon and the weeds will begin to taper off. We will spend the winter months attacking the weeds and roughs. The rain washed out a lot of the bunkers.

The USF Extension has attributed the many dead pine trees to the pine beetle, not the reclaimed water. We have about 70 pine trees scheduled to be removed in early October.

Irrigation will be scheduled around the Hittin' the Pavement event.

Irrigation on the common ground that is hitting passing cars will be readjusted.

Greens and tees have different grass and do not get overseeded.

#### **General Discussion Points:**

- The flashing speed limit sign is a good reminder, successful in stopping speeders. It also counts cars and golf carts. It has also helped in monitoring guests and vendors.
- Guest fees are available to residents with guests who wish to golf.
- The fence-line will be maintained by either Facilities Maintenance or the Common Grounds Department depending on the issue.
- The new security and facilities maintenance trucks were scheduled for replacement in our Reserves due to their ages and mechanical issues.
- If the Buyer's Capital Contribution is approved the funds will go into a Capital Fund, not the Reserve Fund. The Board is looking at putting it into an Asset Acquisition Fund. It will not be used for day-to-day operations. Keep in mind that this is in the neophyte stages of being done and it requires a 2/3 vote to pass.

Hello to everyone in Heritage Pines Community. Remember to please watch your SPEED while driving in the

We have a new phone system at the Gate and Clubhouse. When you call the Gate House, to let us know about someone coming in, you will hear a new answering system. If we are unable to get to the phone, please leave a message after you hear the music and a message. We want to thank you.

### The Gatehouse Emergency phone number is **727-236-0591** (this is a backup number only used when phones are not working).

It is required when residents come to the gate of the front visitor lane to have a valid resident I.D. in order to be let in on the property. Guests and visitors must present a valid picture I.D. also. Let the staff on duty know you are a resident. If coming onto the property and barcode lane is blocked by another vehicle, please stay in the barcode lane. This is an EMERGENCY LANE as well as the residents barcode lane. The staff at the gate will be working on getting this lane cleared first. Visitor lane has to wait until (the vendor's vehicle) is cleared from barcode lane.

Just wanted to let everyone know some of the rule's in Heritage Pines Community:

- 1.) No parking of any vehicles on the streets from 11:00 p.m. until 7:00 a.m.
- 2.) Resident's light poles in front yard are to be on at night (maintained by homeowners).
- 3.) No vendor signs left out or on vehicles overnight.
- 4.) Oversized U-Haul truck's or R.V.'s and boats or trailers are not allowed on streets or in driveways. Resident must get permission from the Front Desk at Clubhouse. Parking at Clubhouse parking lot is available with permission from G.M. Bill Crusselle. Also to be parked in back by the cart barn.



Ask the Recycling Techs – Ruby and Reginald

and Reginald and Ruby will answer them in the newsletter. This month's question is:

Can I recycle ANY plastic bags at the grocery store, including thicker packaging plastic and ziplocs?

Answer: YES and NO. Most of you know that you can recycle your plastic bags at most grocery stores like Walmart and Publix. But here's where it gets confusing. Does that mean just the bags from that store? Or can you recycle more? Most dropoff bag collections accept polyethylene film. This includes high-density polyethylene (HDPE or #2 plastic) and low-density polyethylene (#4 plastic or LDPE). It's great if your bags have markings on them, but since most do not, it's good to know some general guidelines.

Some plastics that can go into the bin are:

- Plastic shopping bags (from any store remove receipts, etc.)
- Food packaging (Ziploc-type bags)
- Bread bags
- Plastic liners from cereal boxes (do not include if they tear like paper)
- Produce bags
- Dry cleaning bags
- Plastic newspaper wrapping
- Product wrapping (such as covers a case of water bottles, etc.)
- Bubble wrap and air pillows (popped)
- Plastic shipping envelopes (remove labeling)

All materials should be clean and dry. Not just a quick rinse – if your bags are not completely clean of food residue, they will contaminate the entire batch.

Other plastics need to go into the trash. These include:

- Frozen food bags
- Cereal box liners that tear like paper
- Biodegradable bags
- Pre-washed salad bags

- Candy bar wrappers
- Chip bags
- Six-pack rings

The Pasco County tree removal permit requires that the owner replant a tree (minimum 30 gallon size) within 30 days. This new tree may be planted anywhere on your property or in Heritage Pines common area with permission from Heritage Pines.

IMPORTANT: Heritage Pines has lost 287 trees this year.

There is no intention, expressed or implied, to approve or disapprove any apparatus, its function, contractor or subcontractor. The maintenance of operation or appearance of any installation is the homeowner's responsibility.

If it should be necessary for you or the contractor to run vehicles or equipment over common grounds to do work at your home or on your property, you must first obtain permission from the General Manager and Village Board (if applicable) before any work can begin. Any damage caused must be repaired at the homeowner's expense. Before any work on the property begins it is suggested that the homeowner informs the contractor, or people doing the work, that it is their responsibility to repair any damages done to common grounds by their equipment. Ultimately the homeowner will incur all expenses related to damages

# ASK THE TECHIE

Q: Recently a popup message appeared on my computer screen telling me my computer was infected with a virus. The

message contained a number for me to call for assistance. When I called the number the person requested I allow them to access my computer remotely. I did this but became suspicious and terminated the call. Since the message continued to popup I called you to remove the popup and determine if my computer had a virus. Was I speaking to an actual support agent or was this a scam?

A: This was definitely 100% a scam. As far as I know, none of the antivirus programs alert with a phone number to call when a problem occurs. If an actual virus is detected the program will display a message indicating that a virus has been detected and report on the success of the repair.

Often, a fake popup message will claim to be from the manufacturer of your computer, the provider of the antivirus software you are using or Microsoft. It is likely that your computer doesn't have a virus at all. The only virus is the popup message itself which prevents you from using your computer until it is removed. If either of the above happens to you I recommend shutting down your computer immediately even if it means pressing the POWER Button. Do not attempt to close the message.

If you ever allow someone access your computer remotely and feel they may not be who they say they are, you should have your computer checked for viruses and other monitoring software. This type of software may be used for unauthorized access to your computer without your knowledge or permission.

Similarly, if you receive an unsolicited call from someone claiming to be from **Microsoft**, **Symantec** or **Hewlett Packard** telling you that they have detected problems on your computer and want to access your computer hang up immediately. This is **DEFINITELY also 100% a scam**.

In recent months, several of my HP clients didn't follow my advice and were talked into allowing a random caller, who claimed to be from **Microsoft**, access to their computers. When they refused to pay for bogus support they later discovered that their computers were password locked which prevented them from logging into their computers. Unfortunately, I was unable to remove the lock requiring a reinstall of **Windows** and the loss of all document, photos, etc. that weren't previously saved on an external backup. The scenario is as follows:

The resident received a call from someone who claims to be from either **Microsoft** or **Windows**. The caller claims that the resident's computer has a serious problem that requires immediate attention. The caller then tells the resident how to bring up an Event Log file and uses this information as evidence that the PC will soon fail to work correctly. The caller requests remote access to resolve the problem. The resident allows the caller remote access and the caller tells the resident that there will be a fee to correct the problem. When the resident was

informed of the cost they told the caller they weren't interested and hung up the phone. What they didn't know was that the caller had already installed a virus on the computer that will lock the computer on the next reboot.

The resident called me when they couldn't get into their computer. After I looked at the computer, I had to inform the resident that without the password I could not remove the virus. To restore the computer to operation I had to do a full install of Windows and all documents and files that were not previously saved were lost.

Be advised that no legitimate business will ever call you about a problem with your computer. These calls are ALWAYS scams. Under no circumstances should you allow an unknown person to remotely access your computer. My advice to everyone is to hang up on the caller.

that playing pickleball has improved their memory, blood circulation, and energy levels, reduced stress and helps with weight loss plans. According to an article on Livestrong.com by Ryan Gargulinski, the benefits go even further:

Although you're burning calories and boosting your mood, you are not putting yourself — or your joints — at high risk, according to Pickleball Canada. The Wiffle ball is fairly slow-moving and much lighter than its tennis ball cousin or its racquetball distant cousin. Even if you do get hit with it, you won't suffer the same severity of injury of a denser and faster ball. The courts are also about half the size of a tennis court, which means less running around than tennis, another factor that keeps the intensity low. We do not yet have a pickleball court here at Heritage Pines. In the meantime, call Francine Raggi-Collins at 727-868-5152 and she will give you info where you can learn to play.



# WATER AEROBICS

Water, water everywhere! Working out in the water is one of the most therapeutic activities one can take part in. Water aerobics builds cardio,



strength and resistance all while being easy on the joints and in a cool and relaxing atmosphere!

#### Here are the Top 10 Reasons to do Water Aerobics:

**Increase muscle strength** – Water is a flowing and constantly changing product of nature, and as such can be every unpredictable in its movements. Since water flows in multiple directions, the resistance in the pool can range from four to 42 times greater than air, ensuring the body's muscles get a rigid workout. In fact, a study conducted found that after 12 weeks of regular aquatic aerobic exercise, participants had made significant gains in strength, flexibility and agility.

**Build endurance** – Unlike traditional weights, which require the human body to push and pull against the weight plus gravity, water resistance is a more natural resistance which requires the body to strain through the water rather than against it.

**Increases flexibility** – As the body is subject to water resistance during water aerobic exercise – which requires

movement in various directions while adjusting to the push and pull of water – the joints naturally increase their range of motion. A study conducted found a significant increase in flexibility after subjecting a group of older adults to aerobic therapy exercise.

**Low-impact exercise** – We may not often think of it, but the traditional impact we place on our joints during a "land workout" can be taxing. In water aerobics, the buoyancy of the water helps takes off some of the impact we tend to place on our body, due to our own water weight. In layman's terms, our body's is not subject to gravity in the water, therefore the impact our joints take on when, say, running in water, is not equal to the impact when running on land. This is particularly appealing to those with joint conditions such as arthritis or those currently undergoing physical rehabilitation.

**Alleviates pressure on the joints** – Studies have shown water-based exercises such as water aerobics relieve pressure placed on joints from normal wear-and-tear and arthritis. In fact, hydrotherapy is shown to be the leading form of therapy for those suffering from joint problems.

**Relieves stress and decreases anxiety** – Watching bodies of water in motion can be one of the most soothing activities one can take part in to help relieve stress, which is why vacations to beaches and island paradises are so popular getaways. But being in the water can be just as relaxing! A study conducted found that aquatic exercise significantly decreased anxiety and negative mood states especially in women.

**Burns calories** – The combination of strength and cardio workouts mixed with water resistance in aquatic exercise ensures the body is getting a full workout. Depending on cardio activity, weight (including additional weights such as dumbbells and weight belts), water temperature, volume and buoyancy, the body can burn between 400 to 500 calories in an hour of exercise.

**Reduces blood pressure** – Water resistance is not just a buoyancy feature to help work the muscles. In fact, the water pressure actually works with your blood as well and enables one's blood flow to circulate more effectively throughout the body, effectively decreasing blood pressure and, in the long run, decreasing resting heart rate. This benefit means your heart is maintaining its productivity while putting less stress on your heart!

**Cooling exercise** – As temperatures get warmer and the summer heat draws near, the desire to exercise in the burning sun may suddenly not seem so appealing, and so naturally dipping into any body of water becomes alluring. Water aerobics can satisfy that need to feel cool in warmer temperatures while still enabling a person to exercise. It's cool, crisp and refreshing, especially knowing you aren't struggling in the heat!

**Popular activity** – Water aerobics is not limited to any age group or skill level. As a result, water aerobics is known to a be one of the most popular bonding activities for friends and family. This is a wonderful way to make some new friends and meet your fellow neighbors. The sport appeals to all ages – with younger generations naturally enjoying the fun to be had in swimming pools while still appealing to the older generations and their need to maintain a moderate level of physical fitness.

#### Water Aerobics tips to know:

- o Always wear water shoes for added cushioning, shock absorption and comfort. Nerve endings are very close to the soles of your feet and constant jumping without shoes may cause nerve damage.
- o Stay hydrated. Though the water cools the body, you will still perspire especially during the summer months. I always suggest you drinking water before, during and after class. If during class you feel thirsty you are already dehydrated. Rehydration will prevent you from overheating, muscle cramping and heat stroke.

## **HPCA TENNIS**

When was the last time you changed the strings on your tennis racket? Well, for me, I changed the strings on one of my rackets that had not been changed in a couple of years. The first time I took it out on the practice court and began to do some serving, I heard a strange and wonderful noise. There was a "pop" noise when I made good contact with the ball. I had not heard that sound in quite a while. I liked it. The new response from the strings was noticeably different on my ground strokes also. This exciting transformation for my racket led me to do a little more research on the subject.

Did you know that there is a rule of thumb about how often to change the strings on your racket? I didn't either, but here it is; "you should change the strings on your racket in a year the same amount of times that you play tennis in a week". That means if you play two times per week, you would have your racket re-strung two times per year. OK, that's the rule of thumb, but it can be a little more complex than that. Some of the variables are; strings begin to lose their tension immediately after the re-stringing process, as much as 10% in the first 24 hours and even more as you begin to play, the type of string you use can lengthen or shorten the time in between re-stringing, the length of time you play each time you're on the court will effect the strings, breaking a string can be a real shortcut to restringing and finally, budget. Depending on the type or combination of strings, it can be kind of pricey.

All this being said, it gives you something to think about. Are you playing the strings, or are they playing you? Don't forget, as your strings begin to lose tension, YOU have to adjust your playing technique to compensate for it. Keeping fresh strings on your racket will aid in your ability to play more consistently.

#### Dolly's Journal of History - Bazzoona

Hi, it's me, Dolly, your beautiful feline historian with another exciting story. For some strange human reason, the capture of a fellow human named Saddam Hussein was extremely important. You might wonder what a cat had to do with the capture but now you will learn how that occurred. Through the months before December of 2003, special forces had been tracking and interrogating Iraqi citizens who had been known to have had contact with Saddam Hussein, the dictator of Iraq, over the years. On December 1st, Staff Sgt. Eric Maddox arrested and interrogated a driver who, after eight hours of interrogation, revealed the name of the man who held the key to finding Hussein. His name was Muhammad Ibrahim, and he had been Hussein's right hand man in ruling Iraq. Over the next several days a Special Operations Task Force rounded up 40 members of Ibrahim's family, and finally a lead took them to a farm house in Tikrit, just outside Baghdad. There, on December 13th, they found Muhammad Ibrahim and two others. Despite intense questioning, none would reveal the hiding place of Saddam Hussein.

However, there was a cat named Bazzoona that sat guietly watching the entire operation from a distance. After several hours of little movement, Bazzoona rose majestically, stretched, and walked slowly and deliberately to a spot where she performed her duty of relieving herself on a fresh pile of desert sand. This might have gone unnoticed except she made a big fuss about covering her waste with vigorous scratching and pawing. In doing so she uncovered a sand covered rope that would otherwise have gone undetected. A member of the team who had a fondness for cats, watched the performance of Bazzoona and became intrigued with the great attention she paid to covering her waste and uncovering the rope. Curiosity is a common attribute of a cat but sometimes humans exhibit the same trait. Cautiously, the soldier approached the rope and with the help of the scratching cat, saw that it led to what looked like a wooden plank in the sand. He brushed away more sand and discovered the outline of what seemed to be a trap door leading to a hidden underground hole.

Bazzoona and the soldier backed away and waited for other soldiers to arrive and assist in opening the trap door. When the door was pulled open it revealed the crouching figure of a human that was quickly identified as Saddam Hussein. The tyrant and once feared ruler of Iraq had been found hiding ignominiously in a shallow underground shelter. Hussein was later tried in an Iraqi court for crimes against the country, found guilty, and hung December 30, 2008. Thus, decades of a ruthless, brutal leader were ended and Iraq was freed. It was through the tireless efforts of an American Special Operations Task Force, a Staff Sqt named Eric Maddox, and an assistant,

that Hussein was brought to justice.

But the story of Bazzoona, a common female Iraqi cat, and her assistance has until now been entirely ignored. Bazzoona remains at a small farmhouse in Tikrit, raising her several broods of kittens, happy and content, unconcerned about the great service she rendered to the citizens of Iraq. But now we know what a hero she was and how she contributed to the discovery of the Tyrant of Baghdad. Would you like another real story from my Journal of History.




