The Space Report is in and has been reviewed by the Board and Management. You will not be surprised to learn we need more space.

purposes, since it has been so long since this has been done, the golf course will be closed on November 6, 7, 8, and 9 to spread the seed and start the watering process. When the golf course reopens on the 10th it will be cart path only until the day after Thanksgiving, November 23rd; at which time carts will be allowed on the course using the 90 degree rule.

This summer the Board has been very active starting to put together a Long Range Plan and this process included a Space Report that provided numerous options that are available for discussion and information that can be used to upgrade and improve our facilities and amenities. We have completed numerous projects this summer that have given the exterior of the Clubhouse a new fresh look and this month we will be addressing the dining room to update and brighten this area.

FROM THE ACCOUNTING DEPT.

2018 HOA Fees

The monthly assessment amount is \$185 per month for Heritage Pines Community Association. Many of the village assessments have changed as well. Please check with your village manager if you have any questions on that amount. You do not have to do anything to change monthly automatic debit amount if you are set up for ACH. It will be processed at the new amount.

ACH and Online/Email Services

If you are not set up for automatic debit (ACH), please consider this simple process. It's easy to set up and you don't have to worry about anything except deducting the amount from your checking balance each month. And in case you did not know, we never

deduct your HOA fee before the third each month. We had many requests to hold off until the third from members that don't receive their direct deposits until then. Also please consider doing away with paper statements. You can view online or have emailed. Just request an "Opt out of paper statement form" from the office, fill out and return with your email address.

Out of Town Mail Service

Recently it was brought to our attention that some mail does not get forwarded if the name on your account is something different, like a trust for example. If you are going out of town for an extended period of time, please let us know in the office. We can set your mail to go to another address so you don't miss important association mailings. Just remember to give us a call or email to change it back when you return home.

Member Charge (Jonas) System

We always ask that you bring your member charge card to the club for purchases. This just helps prevent charge errors. If you do not have your card, please do not sign your charge until you have verified it has correct member information at the top. Also as mentioned before, our Jonas system separates your HOA fees and club charges, so we need to have them paid separately. We appreciate that most monthly accounts are current and if not it is usually a one time over sight and we take that into consideration. Please keep in mind club charges not paid by the 20th of following month can be assessed a \$25 late fee as well as HOA fees not paid in the month they are due.

GOLF COURSE AND COMMON GROUNDS MAINTENANCE NEWS

We are finally starting to experience a little bit of drier weather this month and seeing areas that are drying out faster than others. This helps us identify areas that may need some extra attention but also gives us areas that we can use to measure the overall moisture on the golf course.

The response that we got out of the turf after verticutting all the turf areas last month tells us that it is much needed. We are putting together our agronomic plan for next year and we will start these cultural practices much earlier so we can be a little more aggressive in the tees, fairways, approaches. We were closed on the 13th of last month and during that time we spiked and top-dressed the greens. This will create holes for air and water to penetrate and help level the playing surface. After the sand dried, we brushed the sand into the soil profile and rolled the greens. We are going to continue to utilize our new brush attachment in front of the mowers to stand the turf up and give us a better cut on the greens. This attachment is easy to interchange between mowers, so we can use this on the tees and approaches as well.

We have been working on treating all of the weeds in the tees, approaches, and fairways. We completed another application and will be making hopefully our final application soon. We are also going to be applying herbicides in the rough to treat any weeds that are present along with another pre-emergent application that will keep new weeds from germinating. This should help us knock out the rest of the summer weeds that are hanging around and keep new winter time weeds from popping-up. We will have to treat some areas selectively because of the number of weeds in certain areas. We do not want to be left with large bare areas as we go into the winter months. We are utilizing our fertigation tanks to pump out liquid fertilizer during our irrigation cycles that will keep the Bermuda grass moving in these areas and hopefully fill in any voids left behind. We are going to put out one more tank of liquid fertilizer prior to overseeding to help push the weak areas and replenish food reserves in the plant. This should give the plant everything that it needs to get through the winter months and be in good shape for transition in the spring.

We have finally completed trimming all of the Viburnum hedges around the property. We have treated all of these hedges with a growth regulator that will slow down the vertical growth but still allow the plant to fill in internally. We have also been treating the vine growth under the hedges with a herbicide in hopes of controlling the vines without hurting the plant material. We are adding plant material at the front that is more cold tolerant but will also give a good splash of color at the front entrance. We have been detailing the front entrance and the Clubhouse beds weekly to ensure that they stay clean all of the time. We have been applying supplemental fertilizer to some of the plant material that was struggling along with pre-emergent to help with weed control. This has been working to some extent, but the weed seeds that have been lying dormant have optimal conditions to germinate due to the rain that we have been getting. Also, every time we are in the beds pulling weeds we disrupt our weed barrier and must reapply pre-emergent.

The pine trees throughout the property continue to die. We are removing them as quickly as possible, but all of the tree guys are booked up because this is happening at every property throughout the state. There are multiple things attacking these pine trees and nothing that we can do to control it. Another golf property near us has been trying to control the pine beetles with insecticides but has already spent around \$250,000 without any results. Here, we will continue to remove them as they die and hope that the insects and disease that is killing them will run its course and move on.

We moved the course closure that we had scheduled in October to November to give us another day for over seeding. We will be closed November 6th through the 9th for over seeding. This will allow us to prep the course for seed, apply the seed, and have a day or two to water the course without interfering with play.

Although it may not feel like it, summer is coming to an end. The days are getting shorter and the night time temperatures have dropped a little. We are now getting the heavier rain showers out of the East that bring gusting winds. The weather people are telling us that this is an El Nino winter which means that it will be warm and wet. This could be a good thing since we would like to be able to continue to push the Bermuda grass in the rough to get areas to fill in, but we will have to monitor our moisture in the areas we over seed to avoid disease.

Thank you for all of the compliments we have received about

the conditions of the golf course. We are trying to do things today that will benefit us in a positive way in the future. The preemergent that we are applying in the beds is not going to control weed seeds that are already lying there but will help with any new weed seeds. The organic fertilizers that we are applying now are giving us some added benefits but they are also helping to build organic levels in the soil that will help these areas for years to come.



- Christmas, Hanukkah, and New Year's decorations can be installed 30 days before the holiday and removed by January 10th.

Attention Pet Owners

XII. ANIMALS (PETS AND SERVICE ANIMALS)

All pet related offenses are Fine Category 3.

Category 3: First Offense: Warning / Second Offense: \$100.00 Fine and 60 consecutive days suspension / Additional Offenses: 100.00 Fine and 60 consecutive days suspension

All members who walk their pets must carry cleanup materials with them at all times. Pet owners are responsible for the immediate cleanup of all animal wastes and the disposal of such wastes in the member's own household trash receptacle. Waste disposal in community receptacles, retention areas, storm drains, nature areas, and ponds or on Association property is prohibited.

The homeowner, upon signing this application, understands that the Architectural Control Committee functions to act on behalf of the Board of Directors of Heritage Pines Community Association, Inc. on the acceptability of the appearance of changes to the exterior of buildings or land. There is no intention, expressed or implied, to approve or disapprove any apparatus, its function, contractor or subcontractor. The maintenance of operation or appearance of any installation is the homeowner's responsibility.

If it should be necessary for you or the contractor to run vehicles or equipment over common grounds to do work at your home or on your property, you must first obtain permission from the General Manager and Village Board (if applicable) before any work can begin. Any damage caused must be repaired at the homeowner's expense. Before any work on the property begins it is suggested that the homeowner informs the contractor, or people doing the work, that it is their responsibility to repair any damages done to common grounds by their equipment. Ultimately the homeowner will incur all expenses related to damages

Are you posting all of your eligible scores? To post a nine hole score, you must play 7 to 12 holes. To post an 18-hole score, you must play at least 13 holes. For holes not played, record par plus any handicap strokes allowed. If you pick up on a hole, record your 'most likely' score not to exceed your Equitable Stroke Control limit (ESC). Record ALL 9-hole scores. Let the Handicap System keep track of the scores instead of waiting for another 9-hole score.

Remember that even if you play in a group that plays Quota Points, ALL scores MUST be posted to the GHIN system also.

ASK THE TECHIE

Q: When I was setting up my new Windows 10 computer I was asked to setup a Microsoft Account. Now I have to

enter a password or PIN number every time I turn on my computer. What is the Microsoft Account and can I remove the password to speed up the startup of my computer?

A: Microsoft began adding the Microsoft Account when Windows 8 was introduced in 2012 and continued through Windows 8.1 and Windows 10. The purpose of the account is twofold. If you purchase any APPS (programs) from the Microsoft Store you will need a Microsoft Account to download and install them even if they are free. In addition, for those of you who have multiple computers, phones or tablets running Windows 8/8.1 or 10 various settings will be saved in your account and become available on these devices. For example, your **Desktop Background** and **Internet Explorer Favorites** will be installed automatically on any Windows computer using the same Microsoft Account.

If you want to use the Microsoft Account, you <u>cannot</u> easily disable the login password requirement. I have a tool that does this but it is not normally used by non-technical users. Another option is to switch your login from a Microsoft Account Login to a Local Login which allows the removal of the Login Password requirement. This can be done via the **Windows Control Panel**. When making the switch to a Local Account you have the option to leave the Password Box empty. Once this change to a Local Login is made the Microsoft Account login will be maintained for the Store and other Microsoft programs.

Q: My cable bill seems to increase every year. My neighbor purchased an Amazon Fire TV Digital Media Player (DMP) and has cancelled his cable service. How does this box work and do you recommend I purchase one of these boxes?

A: There are several Digital Media Player (DMP) products available including the **Apple TV**, **Google Chromecast**, **Roku**, and **Amazon Fire TV**. There are also more comprehensive products that run the **Kodi** (formerly **XBMC**) program. These players are single function computers running programs to access movies and TV shows via your Internet connection.

The movies/TV shows are stored online and viewed using programs (APPS) on the DMP. Some of these APPS are free (with ads or limited functionality) or paid subscription. The subscription costs are low but can add up depending on the number of services chosen. I've found that TV shows are available within hours of being shown or the next day. Movies are usually available when the DVD becomes available for purchase or rent. Players running the **Kodi** program offer free movies of reduced picture quality almost immediately upon release.

The prices for a DMP range from \$29 for a basic **Roku** to \$400 for a high end box support **Kodi**. If you require local TV news and live cable channels; services such as **YouTube TV**, **Sling**

TV, **Direct TV Now** etc. are available for a monthly subscription fee. Another advantage of the DMP boxes is their portability. You can take the DMP on vacation or between your Florida and summer homes taking your viewing setup with you.

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

ANGELS IN THE PINES



West Pasco County GENEALOGY Society (WPCGS) has moved to a new home close to Heritage Pines.

The West Pasco County Genealogy Society (WPCGS) was founded in 1983 as a non-profit educational organization of amateur and professional family historians, genealogists and archivists. The Society strives to encourage the research, publication, and preservation of genealogical and historical material: to instruct and lend assistance to the membership and the public in modern methods of ancestry and DNA research. These objectives are accomplished through regular meetings and Society-sponsored workshops, lectures, field trips, socials and other educational activities. The Society offers many opportunities for the public to attend seminars and classes in genealogy-related subjects. There is something for everyone at Society meetings from the novice to the more experienced genealogist. The cost of membership in the Society is \$15.00 annually. Each meeting/seminar is \$5 for members; \$7 for nonmembers. WPCGS meets from 12:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. every third Wednesday of the month at The CARES Rao Musunuru, M.D. Enrichment Center at 12417 Clock Tower Parkway, Hudson, FL, located within the Beacon Woods section of Hudson, except during the summer months of June, July and August. Also, instead of a seminar or meeting in December, there typically is a Society Christmas party held for members.

The topic of discussion is "Emigration Paths." Debbe Hagner, WPCGS president, will present tips and guidelines on researching ancestral emigration from native countries and immigration into America. Focus will be on where one can find both emigration and immigration records.

The Family History Center

The Family History Center offers free research and help from a well versed Genealogist. The Family History Center was established to enable the general public to conduct extensive research on their family ancestry. No religious affiliation to the Mormon Church is required. The Center is open to everyone on the following days: Tuesday – 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Wednesday – 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., Thursday – 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Friday – 6 p.m. to 9 p.m., Saturday – 10 a.m. to noon. Note: hours sometimes change.

The Center is located at 10606 Hilltop Drive in New Port Richey, FL 34654. It is located within the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints' community and library rooms. From the intersection of Little Road and Hilltop Drive (called Embassy Drive on the west side of Little Road) drive east on Hilltop Drive for approximately two miles. The Church is located on the right side of Hilltop Drive. Enter through the main entrance to the building. Ring the doorbell, and an aide will open the door and escort you into the Center.

The Center provides free computer access to the largest genealogical database in the world, www.Familysearch.org, which is maintained by the Church of Latter Day Saints in Salt Lake City, Utah. The public may use the Center's computers to perform ancestry research; can review on-line records of ancestral and historical documents such as birth, marriage and death certificates, census information; church baptismal, marriage and burial records; immigration and naturalization records; historical, military and governmental records, and much more.

Visitors may print out records on the Center's printers, and can create, input and maintain their own family history data in the database, and may utilize the Center's genealogical library of books and microfilm reels that are maintained on site. There are knowledgeable aides at the Center including certified genealogist Debbe Hagner, president of the WPCGS, who assist visitors with operating the computers and provide guidance in using the database. In addition to researching the Familysearch.org database, the Center also provides free access to many other genealogical databases, which normally require paid subscriptions, such as Ancestry.com; Myheritage.com; Find-a-Grave; Fold3.com; and numerous other ancestry record and document resources.

Debbe Hagner, certified genealogist, is generally at the Family History Center on Tuesday's 9 a.m. - 3 p.m., Wednesday 9 a.m. - 1 p.m.; Thursday 9 a.m. - 3 p.m.; Friday 6 p.m. - 9 p.m.; Saturday 10 a.m. - noon to assist you. Hours are subject to change. For confirmation of Debbe's hours TEXT 727-271-0770 or email debbehagner@yahoo.com.

WATER AEROBICS

Water, water everywhere! Working out in the water is one of the most therapeutic activities one can take part in. Water aerobics builds cardio, strength and resistance all while being easy on the joints and in a cool and relaxing atmosphere!

Here are the Top 10 Reasons to do Water Aerobics:

Increase muscle strength – Water is a flowing and constantly changing product of nature, and as such can be every unpredictable in its movements. Since water flows in multiple directions, the resistance in the pool can range from four to 42 times greater than air, ensuring the body's muscles get a rigid workout. In fact, a study conducted found that after 12 weeks of regular aquatic aerobic exercise, participants had made significant gains in strength, flexibility and agility.

Build endurance – Unlike traditional weights, which require the human body to push and pull against the weight plus gravity, water resistance is a more natural resistance which requires the body to strain through the water rather than against it.

Increases flexibility – As the body is subject to water resistance during water aerobic exercise – which requires movement in various directions while adjusting to the push and pull of water – the joints naturally increase their range of motion. A study conducted found a significant increase in flexibility after subjecting a group of older adults to aerobic therapy exercise.

Low-impact exercise – We may not often think of it, but the traditional impact we place on our joints during a "land workout" can be taxing. Relieves stress and decreases anxiety – Watching bodies of water in motion can be one of the most soothing activities one can take part in to help relieve stress, which is why vacations to beaches and island paradises are so popular *continue to next page*

getaways. But being in the water can be just as relaxing! A study conducted found that aquatic exercise significantly decreased anxiety and negative mood states especially in women.

Burns calories – The combination of strength and cardio workouts mixed with water resistance in aquatic exercise ensures the body is getting a full workout. Depending on cardio activity, weight (including additional weights such as dumbbells and weight belts), water temperature, volume and buoyancy, the body can burn between 400 to 500 calories in an hour of exercise.

Reduces blood pressure – Water resistance is not just a buoyancy feature to help work the muscles. In fact, the water pressure actually works with your blood as well and enables one's blood flow to circulate more effectively throughout the body, effectively decreasing blood pressure and, in the long run, decreasing resting heart rate. This benefit means your heart is maintaining its productivity while putting less stress on your heart!

Cooling exercise – As temperatures get warmer and the summer heat draws near, the desire to exercise in the burning sun may suddenly not seem so appealing, and so naturally dipping into any body of water becomes alluring. Water aerobics can satisfy that need to feel cool in warmer temperatures while still enabling a person to exercise. It's cool, crisp and refreshing, especially knowing you aren't struggling in the heat!

Popular activity – Water aerobics is not limited to any age group or skill level. As a result, water aerobics is known to a be one of the most popular bonding activities for friends and family. This is a wonderful way to make some new friends and meet your fellow neighbors. The sport appeals to all ages – with younger generations naturally enjoying the fun to be had in swimming pools while still appealing to the older generations and their need to maintain a moderate level of physical fitness.

Water Aerobics tips to know:

o Always wear water shoes for added cushioning, shock absorption and comfort. Nerve endings are very close to the soles of your feet and constant jumping without shoes may cause nerve damage.

o Stay hydrated. Though the water cools the body, you will still perspire especially during the summer months. I always suggest you drinking water before, during and after class. If during class you feel thirsty you are already dehydrated. Rehydration will prevent you from overheating, muscle cramping and heat stroke.

Meticulously researched, as always with Picoult, this is the story of Ruth Jefferson, a labor and delivery nurse with more than 20 years' experience at a Connecticut hospital. During a shift, she begins a routine checkup on a newborn, only to be reassigned a few minutes later. The baby's parents are white supremacists and don't want Ruth, an African American, to touch their child. The hospital complies with their request, but the next day, the baby goes into cardiac distress while Ruth is alone in the nursery. Does she obey orders, or does she intervene? She hesitates before performing CPR, and as a result is charged with a serious crime. As the trial proceeds and becomes a media sensation, Ruth tries to keep life as normal as possible for her family – especially her teenage son. Ruth and her white public defender must gain each other's trust and come to see what they've been taught their whole lives about others and themselves - might be wrong.

With incredible empathy and candor, Jodi Picoult tackles race, privilege, prejudice, justice, and compassion. <u>Small Great Things</u> is a remarkable achievement from a writer at the top of her game. I challenge each of us, as we read this amazing story, to look inside ourselves honestly, and ask, am I prejudiced?

Following the discussion, members will adjourn to the Dining Room for lunch and more "book talk".

If you were watching the US Tennis Open like I was, you saw a lot of tiebreakers. I thought it might be helpful to review how the tiebreaker works.

It may be helpful to know that the U.S. Tennis Association is one of the only worldwide tennis organizations that does allow tiebreakers to be played in the final set of a match.

Who goes first? The person (team in doubles) who was set to serve at the end of the last game will serve first in the tiebreaker.

Alternate servers. After the first player serves one point, the second server will serve two points. For the rest of the tiebreaker, each server will serve two points at a time.

Serve from the advantage side of the court first. After the first serve in the tiebreaker, each player will perform the first of their two serves from the left, or ad side of the court.

Hit your second serve from the deuce side of the court. After you hit your first serve from the ad side of the court, you move to the deuce side to hit your second serve. The exception to this rule is the very first point in the tiebreaker. That point is always served from the deuce side.

Keep your side at the beginning of the tiebreaker. In tennis, players only switch sides at the end of odd numbered games in a set. The tiebreaker is technically the thirteenth game in a set, so both players will remain on the same side of the court they were on for the twelfth game.

Change sides after every six points. In tiebreakers, players will alternate sides after every point where the total score is a multiple of six. Switching sides keeps everything fair.

Switch sides in the middle of your service set. Because players change sides of the court at the end of an even number of points (six) and servers alternate after odd numbered points, whoever was serving before the side switch will serve their second serve after the side switch.

Trade sides after the tiebreaker. If there is another set after the tiebreaker, the players will start the first game of the new set on the opposite ends of the court from where they ended up in the tiebreaker.

Be the first to score seven points. In a tiebreaker, points are simply counted as one, two, three, four and so on. Just like a normal game of tennis, you must attain a two point advantage over your opponent to win the tiebreaker.

How about a "Super Tiebreaker"? The first player or team to win ten points by a two point margin wins the match. If the

score in the match tiebreaker becomes tied at ten points, play continues until a player or team has a two point lead.

What a roller coaster ride the US Tennis Open was this year. All but one each, for the men and the women, of the top ten seeds were eliminated early in the tournament. Congratulaions to tournament winners Novak Djokovic and Naomi Osaka. Two of the most stunning upsets were, #1 Simona Halep defeated in the first round by #44 Kaia Kanepi and #2 Roger Federer defeated in the fourth round by #55 John Millman. John then went on to have a 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ hour wrestling match with Novak Djokovic. John finally lost, but a guy like John Millman gives us all hope that if we believe in ourselves, great things CAN happen.

Have you been thinking about how much fun and exercise you used to get when playing tennis? Well, c'mon out on Tuesdays and Thursdays for some open tennis for men and ladies tennis on Mondays and Thursdays. Make sure to contact Shirley Monroe for more information about ladies tennis. Dues to join the Tennis Association are a mere \$10 per year. Open tennis starts at 8:30 a.m. You don't have to sign up to play. There's no long term commitment. Come when you are able, don't when you're otherwise busy. It's a great way to meet new people and make new friends.

Kathleen Lonergan and Chuck Widlowski have volunteered to be the Heritage Pines Tennis Championship Tournament committee for 2019. They have set the dates for the tournament as March 4th through the 10th. Chuck has told me that these dates do not interfere with any golfing events. planning for retirement. In a nutshell it boils down to this:

You qualify for a higher social security payment because of your Military service, for active duty any time from 1957 through 2001 (the program was done away with January 1st, 2002). Up to \$1200 per year of earnings credit credited at time of application - which can make a substantial difference in social security monthly payments upon your retirement. You must bring your DD-214 to the Social Security Office and you must ask for this **benefit to receive it!** This is something to put in your files for when you apply for Social Security down the road.. It is NOT just for retirees, BUT anyone who has served on active duty between January 1957 to December 31st. 2001.



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
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
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
